OBITUARY

Raymond Daniels Sanford

The sad news of the death of Raymond Daniels Sanford Tuesday night was circulated through town Wednesday morning.

His death created concern from the fact that he was the chief and only witness for the defense in the coming trial of Robert McCulley for the killing of Con Finucane, a few weeks since. At the coroner's jury he gave his testimony in a clear tone, and expressed himself as a man of intelligence and firm convictions.

His death was due to typhoid pneumonia. He was born in Michigan, Nov. 5, 1847. A wife and two children, a boy and a girl, and a father, mother and two sisters are left to mourn his death. He had never been sick before, and had the appearance of being a strong healthy man. He was not insured and belonged to no secret or benevolent order. The family have the sympathy of all in their bereavement.

The funeral will take place some time today, Thursday.

Mrs. Sallie Linebarger

Selma, Calif.—Mrs. Sallie Linebarger, aged 44 years, 7 months and 7 days, beloved mother of Mrs. M. A. Striplin, passed to her Heavenly reward at the home of the latter here, last Friday morning, November 27, 1908. While enfeebled by the stress of years, she had been ill only about three weeks. The end was not expected and the passing was peaceful with the words from her lips, "I am going, good bye."

The funeral was conducted from the First Methodist Episcopal church at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, sermon by Rev. Richard Fysh of San Francisco, assisted by Rev. D. Stewart of the Christian church and Pastor S. J. McConnell. Rev. Fysh was deceased's pastor at Lakeview, Oregon, for a number of years and there preached the funeral of Mr. Linebarger ten years ago. The remains were laid to rest in the Selma cemetery.

Miss Sally Fry was born in Northampton county, Pennsylvania, April 20, 1824. On August 27, 1846 she was married to Samuel Linebarger, and with her husband a little later moved to Sigourney, Iowa, where they resided for 22 years. At this place in 1863 both united with the Methodist Episcopal church. Leaving Iowa in 1873 they came to California locating at Chico, Butte county, where they resided for 11 years. In 1888 they moved with their family to Lakeview, Oregon. Here February 1, 1888, the husband was called by death, the widowed wife and mother taking up her home with her daughter, Mrs. M. A. Striplin. In 1908 Mr. and Mrs. Striplin and family, accompanied by deceased located in Selma where she has since resided.

Four children were born to these now deceased but Sainted parents, and all survive father and mother, namely: W. W. Linebarger, of Tulare, Cal.; C. P. Linebarger of Chico, Cal.; S. L. Linebarger of North English, Iowa and Mrs. M. A. Striplin of near this city; and all were present at the funeral except Mr. Linebarger of Iowa.

Deceased was a devoted Christian lady, beloved by children and grandchildren, and during her long life made many friends in the several localities where she resided; and sympathy and condolence will go out from every acquaintance to the families now in sorrow.
