COURSE IN HORTICULTURE

A six weeks course in horticulture is now under way at the Agricultural College, Corvallis, and there is a large attendance from different parts of the state, the attendance being more than double that of last year. Some of the most interesting work in the course is yet to come. Many fruit growers are unable to attend the course for the entire six weeks, but are able to come for a few days or several weeks. The course is open to them at any time. There will be two weeks more of apple packing and work in budding and grafting. In addition to this, special lectures are given on the various phases of fruit growing, truck gardening and landscape gardening.

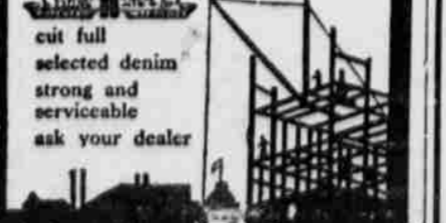
