One of the most interesting exhibits of seed grains displayed at the big state fair this year was arranged by an English firm which has a branch house in Chicago and at one or two eastern points. Magnificent types of wheat, rye and barley were on display, while a breed of improved Swedish oats was shown which weighed fifty pounds to the bushel and which at points in Canada had given yields as high as 120 bushels to the acre. While this type of oats would not do as well in the States because of less favorable climatic conditions, it would doubtless give a yield far superior to that of kinds ordinarily raised.
