GRAVES OR CICERO, WHICH?
 An example of how graft and dishonesty permeate all avenues of society and which among the "higher ups" is looked upon as a virtue rather than a crime is had in the case of Robert N. Graves, a "business" man of San Francisco who, when examined as a juror in the trial of the notorious bribe-giver, Pat Calhoun, said:
 "My sympathies and prejudices are all with Mr. Calhoun, Mr. Ford, and their associates. My friends are all of that class, and I never would vote to punish any of them."
 How different are the words of Cicero, the Roman, the noblest of them all, who in 63 B. C. had this to say as to what constituted "Friendship":
 "Let this then be established as a law of friendship, that we should neither ask of our friends, nor do at their request, anything that is dishonorable; and the plea that one has acted in a friend's behalf is a base excuse to offer for any crime, and particularly for an offense against the State. For the present situation of the Republic is such that we ought to look far ahead for the dangers that may threaten it. Already it has, to some extent, occupied a different ground and followed a different course from those prescribed by the customs of our ancestors."
 If the words of Cicero meant anything then how infinitely greater is the need of their application in these times when graft, hydra-headed and with its octopus tentacles is reaching everywhere, and gathering within its coils the people's servants, who place utilities, that should belong to the public, into the hands of these monsters of greed! Then, when an aroused public conscience calls for punishment of grafters and restitution of these privileges wrongfully obtained, men of the stamp of this man Graves refuse to do the public justice on the specious and unreasonable plea of "Friendship."
 Under such conditions no wonder that an aroused public sentiment is sweeping the country, and such men as Roosevelt, Cummings, La Follette (and shades of darkness! John D. Rockefeller, Andrew Carnegie and Jacob Klein, recent recruits in civic reform) and others, urge prosecution and punishment of the Calhoun stripe.
 Meanwhile, socialism is looked upon by growing numbers as the only way that leads to reform. But, will it do so? Can the leopard change his spots?
 After all that is said and done, is it not blind subservency to party, right or wrong, the cloak under which these rascals ply their calling of robbing the people?
 The only escape from these conditions seems to be a little independent thinking. Then, let the ax fall where it will do the most good. If a Calhoun or a Hinkey-Dink or a Reuf happen to be where the ax falls, well and good. But do not shield the higher-up and punish the lower down. A stricter, sterner justice would punish the former more surely and with greater volume.

Reports of the colonist travel to the Northwest over the Harriman lines for the first eight days of March have been received. The total number of tickets sold for Oregon points was 1545, an increase of 301 over last year's period. Of these, 275 were for Portland and 272 for points south of Portland.

This is to be an English syndicate has purchased the island for the well known copper deposits. The American syndicate referred to, however, has more likely purchased Pie Island, for its mineral deposits, silver, gold and copper, which lies between the Isle Royal, and the main Canadian shore.

Curing a Puller.
 It is claimed by one who has tried it that a driving horse that pulls on the bit can be cured by fastening a small ring on each side of the bridle and as near the brow band as possible. Pass the lines through bit rings and snap them into the rings at the brow band. This, with a common jointed bit, will enable a child to hold a "puller," or hard mouthed horse, with ease under almost all circumstances. It can be used on a fast horse in double team or on both, as desired. It is cheap and easily applied, and it won't make the mouth sore.
Indications of Disease.
 An irregular pulse in a horse is a strong symptom of grave disease. In a healthy horse the pulse beats thirty-two to thirty-eight per minute, but forty-eight per minute may not denote disease in some horses. To take the pulse place the finger of the right hand across the artery below the jaws, holding the watch in the left hand, and count the beats. A rise of temperature above 100 degrees denotes that something is wrong. To take the temperature use a thermometer. By practice a high temperature can be easily detected by inserting the hand in the mouth of the animal. Cold legs and cold ears and cold sweat are bad symptoms. Difficult and quick breathing indicate lung trouble, and snoring is caused by disease of the brain. A rough coat is a bad symptom, denoting indigestion. Fever in a horse is indicated by dullness, a quick pulse, high temperature, extended and inflamed nostrils and usually great desire for water.




