MERCHANT WILL RAISE POULTRY

E. C. Ahlstrom, of the firm of Ahlstrom Bros., has gone to Crooked Creek, and taken up a homestead, and will grow up with that rich valley. He will raise garden truck, fruit and chickens.

Mr. Ahlstrom, by the way is quite an expert in poultry matters. The past winter, while there was an egg famine, during December January and February, from only 32 hens he secured over 1000 eggs which brought him 50c per dozen.

We may be giving the snap away but he feeds his hens for one thing plenty of soaked alfalfa leaves which answers the same purpose as green food and besides he has a bone cutter and feeds them plenty of scrap bone and meat which he grinds in the cutter before feeding.

Brown, who has experimented with the effect of colors on hens for some time, says he finds that his flock of hens lay from one to three more eggs a day since he put green paint on the henhouse. He noticed no perceptible change with other colors he tried.

The color theory is that the hens should have the same color scheme in their winter environment as nature offers in spring and summer.
