## PROMINENT NURSERY MAN HERE

G. W. Alexander, a prominent orchardist, and nurseryman from Julian, Nebraska, is here looking over the field with a view of locating. The only draw back he can see to this country is lack of railroad transportation. Mr. Alexander has traveled extensively the past few weeks, and has visited Spokane, Wenatchee, Hood River, and Rogue River districts, and believes the future glimmers as good prospect here of successful fruit production as those of any of the sections named. This is the judgement of an expert and is worth something to Lake County. He will remain some time and go into the matter of fruit production in all parts of Lake county before he will make a final decision.

The Klamath Herald in advocating the construction of a new and shorter road to Lakeview, says that "half a million pounds of wool will come out of Lake county each year." The very conservative estimate of the Lakview Board of Trade places our wool shipments the past year at one and a half million pounds, which from various causes was an exceedingly light clip.
