The Portland Telegram says coyote hunters will be given free board and lodging by the sheepmen of eastern Oregon during the coming spring and summer, according to the statement of Attorney Dan P. Smythe, secretary of the State Woolgrowers' Association. While all the sheepmen of this part of the state have not yet agreed to do so by the executive committee of the state association and many of them have signified willing ness to comply. Some have even declared their intention of offering bounty for animals killed on their ranges, in addition to the one offered by the state.

The purpose of these arrangements is to stimulate the crusade for the extermination of the predatory wild animals. The national forest service has announced its intention of putting skilled hunters on all the reserves and the sheepmen are urged to cooperate with these hunters in every possible manner.
