HAS SUCCESS WITH POTATOES

Klamath Herald, 14: Elmer Applegate who owns 17.4 acres in the Enterprise tracts is setting out one acre in apples this year. He does not expect to go heavily into the growing of fruit although he believes it will do well here but it is only his intention to set out a home orchard for his own use. Mr. Applegate will plant six acres to potatoes and expects to have even a better crop this year than he had last. Last year he averaged a profit of \$400 an acre. A portion of the acreage yielded 400 bushels per acre.
One small patch planted by Mr. Applegate yielded an average of 700 bushels to the acre. This is believed to be the record yield in this county. This would make 42,000 pounds to the acre, or one pound of potatoes to each square foot. This is certainly growing them pretty thick, but Klamath is the place where things grow.

ELECTRIC ROAD TO KLAMATH FALLS

The Examiner when it advocated the construction of an electric line to Klamath Falls, was not aware then that steps were already taken by local capitalists with that purpose in view. But such is the case, and we now believe it is only a question of a short time till the work is taken up in earnest.
DENVER, April 5.—A heavy snow storm is prevailing today over the entire Rocky Mountain region, extending as far south as Santa Fe, N. M., north into Central Wyoming, and west to Salt Lake City. At Denver more than eight inches has fallen and is still falling heavily. Landers, Wyo., reports about nine inches. The temperature is moderate and the storm will be of great benefit. Railroads are suffering but little.
The N. C. O. had another wreck last week near Plumas Junction. Seven cars were smashed to kindling wood and the contents were broken and scattered about. The passenger car also went into the ditch, but fortunately no one was seriously injured.
Mt. Etna, near Naples, Italy, is in a state of eruption, causing much alarm among the natives.
