MINES AND MINING

The Hoag Mines, on the State Line 15 miles south of here, and situated about two miles from New Pine Creek are beginning to attract outside interest as the following wire indicates:

RENO (Nev.), April 21.—As the result of a report of a big gold strike in Northern Nevada, close to the Oregon line, quite a number of mining men have already left for the northern fields. Yesterday Burt Rush and Edward Ashton, who have taken part in nearly all gold stampedes in this state, were among the men rushing to the new finds.

WATER RIGHTS OPEN TO ANYONE

WASHINGTON, April 20.—A decision was made in the Supreme Court yesterday in the case of the Boguillas Land Company, of Arizona, against Curtis and others, that riparian land owners cannot prevent the taking by others of water from a stream for irrigation purposes because of such ownership. This decision is stated by Oregon attorneys here to be of vital importance in Oregon, where numerous cases involving the doctrine of riparian rights pending in the local courts will be influenced by it.

MANY SHEEP DID FROM POISONING

J. C. Shelhammer was in Tuesday from Crooked creek. He reports that sheepmen generally are losing a lot of sheep this spring in driving them from the desert. Dave Eller in this way is reported to have lost 60 head, Tucker 100 head, Newell 34, Holbrook 30, Noris 12, and others have lost more or less. Mr. Shelhammer says he has lost none, and attributes the fact to giving his sheep plenty of salt before driving from their winter range. He says that all who salt their sheep plentifully escape less from their eating poisonous weeds. The administering of salt seems to be a sure antidote against loss, and he believes the method will be followed by all sheep men in the future.

PROUDFOOT SAYS SHEEP DISEASED

W. J. Proudfoot U. S. Sheep Inspector returned Sunday from a trip to the sheep camps on the desert. He reports that the flocks are not in as good condition as he expected to find them, there being considerable scab, while many have died from eating poisonous weeds. While away Mr. Proudfoot's splendid saddle horse in some way became entangled in a picket rope, which broke its leg, compelling the gentleman to shoot the horse. It was quite a loss, as he was one of the finest horses in the county, and was highly prized by its owner.
