Madras—Alex Holbrook returned last Friday from a visit to the county seat, where he went to see about a lien which the county holds on his land for clearing it of weeds last fall. Mr. Holbrook's place was among those from which the county removed the weeds last fall, under the so-called anti-weed law, and when he returned recently from Kansas, he found that the county held a lien on his place for \$133. A number of other non-resident owners of land in this section fared similarly, the county court having entered vigorously into the work of exterminating the noxious weeds in the farming sections of the county. Their efforts in this direction are generally approved in this district, though occasionally the operation of the law works a hardship upon some owner

Mr. J. Frank Moroney, chairman of the California Branch of the National Model License League, announced that the trade convention of all the wine spirit interests of the Pacific Coast, which was to have been held in San Francisco, May 10, has been postponed to May 17. The change in date is due to the fact that the time originally selected conflicts with other conventions to be held in San Francisco

Prineville—J. E. Roberts was in from his "dry farm" at Alkali Flat last Monday. Mr. Roberts is the only dry farmer who threshes grain between Prineville and Silver Lake, and he finds a ready home market for his crops among the ranchers who do not harvest wheat, rye, barley or oats. "People said I was crazy when I started to farm out there," says Mr. Roberts, "but I managed to take some premiums at the county fair and can raise most anything on that worthless land." Mr. Roberts has water for household purposes and for stock, and irrigates a small tract but no one has been able to strike water by sinking a well in that neighborhood, and several settlers have sold their claims to Mr. Roberts because they had no water supply
