ROOSEVELT POLICIES SAFE YET

It has been claimed that all of President Taft's cabinet were merely representatives of the magnates of the different trusts, but such does not seem to be the case, judging from the fact that before nearly all the justices of the Supreme Court of New York and Brooklyn and many widely known corporation attorneys, (George W. Wickersham, Attorney General in the cabinet of President Taft, spoke with the authority of the administration. Mr. Wickersham said:

"We have heard frequently of late from the representatives of certain business interests in the country cries of, 'Let us have peace' and 'Leave us alone.' The price of peace is obedience to law; those who honestly try to keep the law need not fear prosecution."

Obviously, the stage in the affairs of this Nation arrived where either the government must be controlled by the people, or by the trusts and their allied interests.

The administration of President Roosevelt favored the people, and if Mr. Wickersham voices the present administration the rapacious and predatory barons have got to a point where they must keep within the bounds of decency in their greed or else be put out of "business" altogether.

Senator Bailey has introduced in income tax amendment to the tariff bill providing for a straight tax of 3 per cent on all incomes above \$5,000 a year. It exempts all incomes from federal, state, county and municipal securities, salaries of all state officers and incomes of corporations below \$5,000.

It is pretty clear to the ordinary mind that an income tax will compel those best able to meet their just proportion of taxation. That is the whole thing in a nut shell.

BULLETIN NO. 7.

Issued by the Oregon State Board of Health Regarding Sanitation of Hop Yards, Wheat Fields and Fruit Orchards, and for the Mutual Benefit of Growers and Employees.

(1) Camps for employees should be on high ground and in the open, and not contiguous to swamps or sloughs.

(2) The water supply should be abundant for all purposes, including paths, and from springs or driven wells.

(3) Camp garbage should be placed in boxes or barrels with tight lids and hauled away and buried or buried at least every other day.

(4) For the disposal of body waste there should be numerous vaults dug not less than three feet deep with suitable buildings, which should be tight to the ground.

(5) It should be the business of some one person to visit all employees reported ill, and should give rise to suspicion that it may be contagious, the county health officer or some other physician should be summoned at once.

(6) All employees should be made to know that flies are great carriers of disease, and that everything possible should be done to discourage their presence in camp.

(7) Where a stationary or movable cook-house is in use, the same should be well ventilated, and all food should be kept in cool places.

carefully screened to prevent contamination from dust and flies. No slops should be thrown on the ground near the cook-houses, but should be placed in a pit to be covered with earth.

(8) In those occupations where large quantities of dust are present, the eyes should be protected with screens and smoked glasses and care taken at night to cleanse the same thoroughly.

(9) It shall be the duty of every physician visiting the sick in situations covered by this bulletin to report any unsanitary conditions, and especially those covered by the foregoing paragraphs, to the proper authorities for investigation and correction.

(10) Do not employ people who habitually cough. There is a strong probability that such persons are tuberculous, and tuberculous being contagious, makes it very dangerous for their associates.

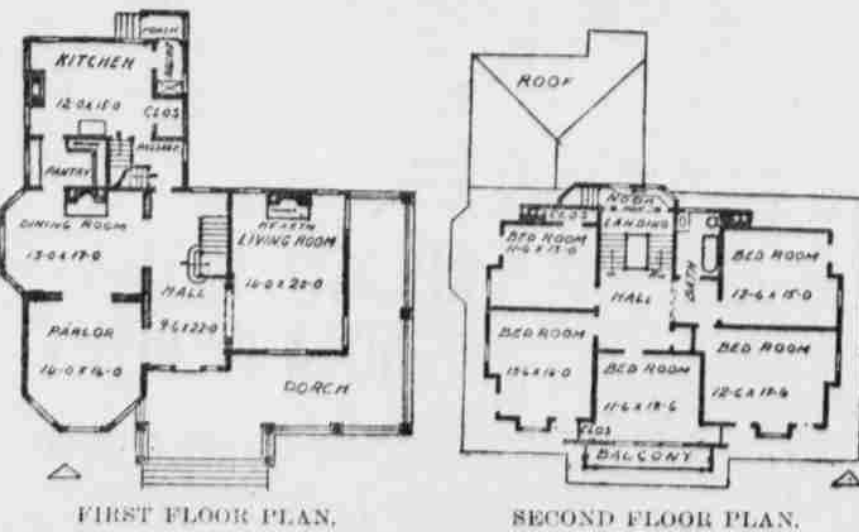
