## Lakeview Has Two Moving Picture Shows

The opening of the new moving picture show in the Snider Opera House, Sunday night was in the nature of a society event. Upwards of 400 people were present and all were pleased. The singing of Mr. Wilson was well received. Miss Mae Snider was the accompanist.

The Opera House has been nicely decorated and with the new and very comfortable opera seats, makes it one of the roomiest and best appointed houses of the kind to be found in any of the smaller towns of the Pacific Northwest.

The pictures shown were first-class, and the vibration usually associated with such presentations was entirely eliminated.

Lakeview now has two very creditable moving picture shows, and in that respect is fully abreast the tendency of the times.

In this connection, few are aware of the extent of the moving picture show throughout the civilized world. According to statistics, published in the New York Post, there are in the United States seven million moving

picture houses, in which \$50,000,000 is invested. Chicago has 313 such shows, New York 300, St. Louis 205, Philadelphia 186, San Francisco 131, Pittsburgh 90 and Boston 31.

It is calculated that nearly 200 miles of films are exhibited every day in the United States. The making of these films is conducted by an organization, which has a large capital, and which maintains a crew of agents in all parts of the world photographing scenes of interest.

The establishment of this business has been of particular benefit to the poor, especially of the cities, and to all the people of all smaller towns which in connection with the photograph, given an opportunity to see and hear things heretofore only available to those of the wealthier class in our larger cities.

Obviously the moving picture show which appeals so strongly to the people and which is so cheaply laid before the public, will be a valuable educational force. It will be interesting to note the development of the business the next ten years.


