PRODUCTIONS AND SALES ARE ALIKE

Butte Valley and Goose Lake Valley Very Similar

Those who are most familiar with conditions, state that the soils and products of Lake County are identical with those of the Butte Valley in Northern California.

The government has prepared a little booklet, entitled "The Soils of Butte Valley," which may be obtained by addressing the Secretary of Agriculture at Washington, D. C.

The latest issue of the Dorris Booster, published in that valley, gave voice to the following, which so nearly accords with conditions here that we give it a space in these columns. It says:

An era of fruit raising is about to dawn upon Butte valley. No better evidence of this could be asked than that contained in the fact that old timers—those who have been in the country for years and made a thorough study of conditions—are interesting themselves in the subject and this season will set out many young apple trees. The advent of the railroad has been the signal for our people to awake to a realization of the magnificent resource possessed by the country. They appreciate the fact that the hundreds of acres of foot hill land in Butte Valley are just as capable of raising apples as any of the famous apple growing countries of the west. And they know that by planting apples on the foot hill land they will shortly raise the market value of same from its present quotation of \$20 to \$40 an acre to \$100 and \$150 an acre. Also they know that by raising on the apple land they not only make it more valuable, but thereby enhances the worth of surrounding lands.

Apples can be raised here all right. There can be no disputing that in the face of the real evidence which is at hand. The apple orchards of the Oteys, the Gradises, the Slys, the Falls, the Pratybers, the Churichills and a few others, give sufficient proof that the fruit will thrive under conditions which pertain here. Those who have sampled Butte valley apples will tell you honestly that they surpass even the famous Hood river product. Only one argument is advanced as a deterrent to apple culture at this altitude. That is the danger from frosts. But here you don't that same danger exist in all the best apple countries? To be sure it does. Right over in the much vaunted valley of the Rogue they had a killing frost last August. But the fruit was not injured. That eternal vigilance which is the price of the fruit grower's success was on duty. Now days the frost has no terrors for the fruit grower. Smudges are placed in the orchard, ready for instant use. A new faugled thermometer has been invented which causes a bell to ring when the mercury reaches a few degrees within the frost point. Then the fruit grower lights his smudges and Johnnie Frosticus is foiled. A Missouri man has discovered that a yarn string attached to the limbs of the trees, with the ends in a bucket of water will save the fruit from frost. We suggest to our readers who have foothill land that two-bit pieces invested in young apple trees this fall will return to them within a very few years in the form of five and ten dollar gold pieces. Not only will this golden harvest be from the crop, but from the increased value of the land.

Californians Located

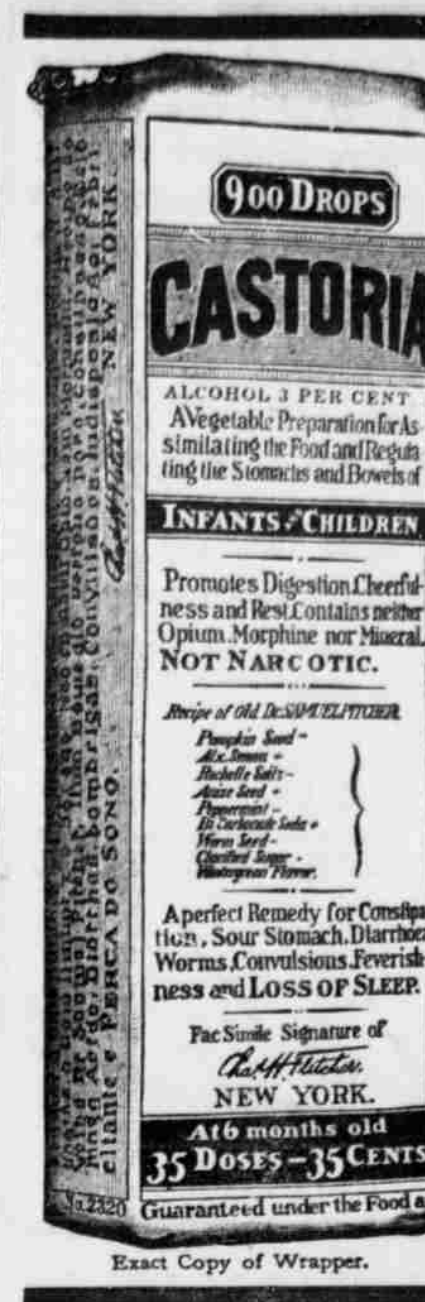
The Covina, Calif., Wave of the 21st Inst has this to say of some new arrivals:
A letter to Covina friends announces the arrival of the Goldsberry family at their new home in Lake County, Oregon, for which they left some weeks ago. Mr. Goldsberry was one of the Covina purchasers of Oregon farms, and went up to be present at the opening of the lands which take place September 9th.
The letter states that Mr. Goldsberry has secured work with the land company on the water system they are putting in, and is now working on a tunnel water way being cut through the mountains twenty-two miles from Lakeview. Lakeview is Mr. Goldsberry's post office.

How to Tell Meat
