Investigation as to the Cause of Sheep Poisoning in Lake County

Gilbert D. Brown, acting supervisor for Fremont National Forest, with headquarters at Lakeview addressed the following letter May 3rd to Prof. Pernott, Corvallis, in regard to sheep poisoning in this county:

On April 30, the stomachs of two sheep were forwarded to you for diagnosis.

Sheep are still dying in the same manner, but all concerned have so far been unable to determine the cause.

I have not as yet been able to obtain any information that would assist in determining the cause of death. They first get stiff, lose control of their legs and die in 18 or 20 hours.

Mr. Brown received the following in reply from C. E. Bradley, of the Oregon State Experiment Station under date of May 13, which will be of interest to the sheep men of this section:

Professor Pernott has asked me to write you further concerning the sheep poisoning question. As he explained in his letter to you, we found nothing on examining the stomachs which you enclosed, that would give a clue to the poisoning, as the only abnormal condition noted was a blackening of the inner coating of the stomach, which probably was a post mortem condition. From your description of the manner in which the sheep died it seems very probable it must be a poisonous weed which is the cause of the trouble, and the two weeds or plants obtainable at this time of the year on the range that are known to be poisonous are lark-

spur and the poison camas. The contents of the stomachs which you sent were very fine so that it was difficult to identify them by microscopic means. In bulletin 45 of the Montana Station and bulletin 113 of the Colorado Station, as well as in the year book of the Department of Agriculture for 1900, descriptions are given of investigations on larkspur poisoning as well as other poisonous plants obtainable on the range. The symptoms of larkspur poisoning are stiffness of the limbs, great difficulty in breathing, and the animal usually dying in a short time in spasms. The antidote as worked out by Chestnut and Wilcox is a one per cent solution of permanganate of potash mixed with a one per cent solution of aluminum sulfate given to the sheep in the early stages of the poisoning. These compounds are now furnished in capsules ready for use, I understand. In cases where the sheep is in the last stages of the poisoning a hypodermic injection of a one fourth or one third grain of atropine sulfate, which is a powerful heart stimulant, has been used successfully. A dash of ammonia in the nostrils has also been used in the last stages of the poisoning.

An examination of the range where the sheep are known to have been poisoned will determine whether the plants are obtainable there or not, and a close observation of the sheep in feeding would also confirm the matter as to whether either of these plants has been the source of the difficulty.

If we can assist in any way further in this matter I trust you will feel free to call upon us.
