Victor Harvey, died at his farm on the West Side, Saturday, the 19th inst, at 7:20 a. m. He had been ill with appendicitis, but recovered, only to be stricken with inflammation of the stomach, while working in the field, last Friday. He was taken to the house, and medical aid summoned but was too far gone for help and died the next morning.

Mr. Harvey was born in San Jose, Cal., Jan. 29, 1874, being 46 years and five months old at the time of his death. He had lived in Lake County most of the time since 1879.

He was married Oct. 4, 1895, to Alice Annie Arthur, a native of Cedar Co., Mo., who has resided in Lake County since 1880. Besides his wife and one child, he leaves to mourn his loss a father and mother and one brother in Salt Lake, one brother at Chico, one at Oakland, and his brother-in-law at Lakeview.

The funeral services were conducted at the West Side cemetery by Rev. H. J. Davis, who pronounced a very fine sermon. There was a large attendance of friends and relatives.

Mr. Harvey was a hardworking man, and had great promise of crops this year and it is likely that his ambition to get on caused him to over do when not in the proper condition for hard and continued labor.

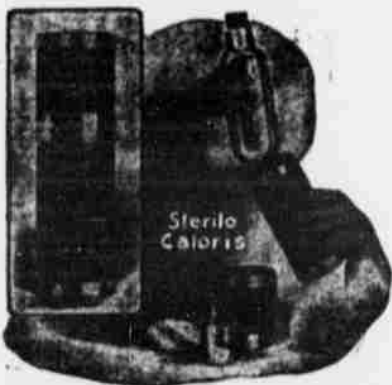

SCHOOL LAND ASSIGNMENTS

We have, in this district where we are locating, several hundred acres of good level, valley land that is subject to entry under the "Enlarged Homestead Act," whereby anyone may acquire 320 acres as a homestead. The qualifications under this act are the same as under the old homestead law, about the only difference being the amount of land one may acquire being 320 acres instead of 160 acres

and the required cultivation being one eighth of the land in the entire entry beginning with the second year and one fourth beginning with the third year, the same to be continuously cultivated until the proof is made. One is allowed to commute an entry under this act. Otherwise the law is about the same as the General Homestead Law.
