Needle Club Thursday.

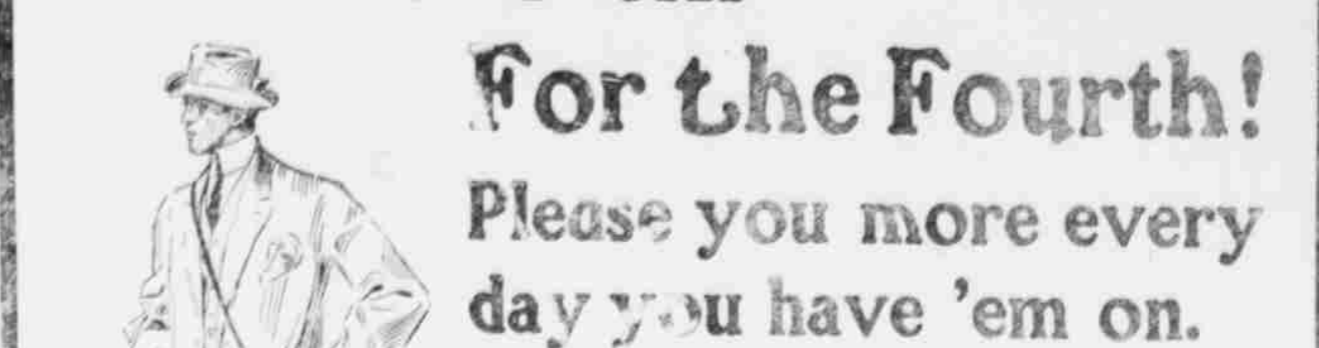
Capt. Follett, one of the old-timers

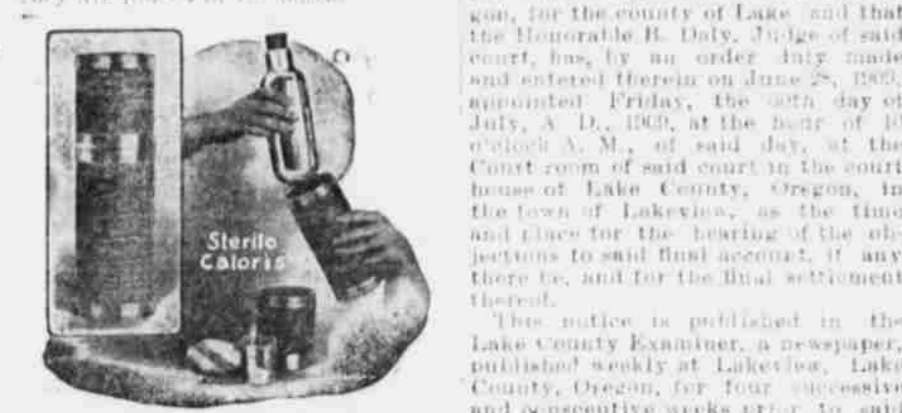

SCHOOL LAND ASSIGNMENTS

We have, in this district where we
are locating, several hundred acres
of good level, valley land that is
subject to entry under the "Enlarged
Homestead Act," whereby anyone
may acquire 320 acres as a homestead.
The qualifications under this act are
the same as under the old homestead
law, about the only difference being
the amount of land one may acquire
being 320 acres instead of 160 acres
and the required cultivation (being
one eighth of the land in the entire
entry beginning with the second year
and one fourth beginning with the
third year, the same to be contin-
uously cultivated until the proof is
made. One is allowed to commute an
entry under this act. Otherwise the
law is about the same as the General
Homestead Law.
