THE TWO HORNED RHINOCEROS

Undoubtedly Mr. Roosevelt and his square jawed rhinoceros, formerly found quite frequently in some remote sections of Africa, but now practically extinet. Some authorities state that unicorn, though the unicorn as pletured was a comparatively small and very agile creature. The animal noticed him when he was about a hundred yards distant and began at once to advance toward him slowly, but threateningly. His horse stopped and stood as if petrified. When within a few yards the rhinoceros made a dash forward, making a violent assault on rider and mount. Oswell regained consciousness on the back of a strange horse which was being led by one of his native servants. The rhinoceros had driven its horn through his leg and through his horse's body and had so completely apset both horse and rider that Oswell himself had been knocked senseless by a blow from his falling stirrup iron Oswell's horse was killed, and the great hunter himself was kept prostrate by his wounds for several months. Even slight wounds are very

slow to heal in the African climate. The natives prize the rhino's horner dearly. They make cups from them, which, they say, betray the presence of any poison in drinks. A well known German writer says, "If poisoned wine is put into a rhinoceros horn cup, the cup will instantly split wide open." The horn shavings are saved by the natives as an infallible for convulsions and a dozen other diseases. They eat the rhino's hump as a rare delicacy. 


