### HOAG

A mining deal of no small proportions has just been consummated in the Hoag mining district. On Saturday, Aug. 7, Wm. A. Schuamers and others sold to J. F. Cutler and others 200 acres of patented ground, situated on Mount Hoag. This ground has a splendid mineral showing, in fact, several well defined gold bearing leads have already been uncovered on this property. Mr. Cutler is a practical mining man of long years experience and after several weeks of diligent sampling of the Pine Creek mines, his estimate of the future of our camp is best expressed by the purchase, for cash, of so large and attractive acreage of mineral ground.
