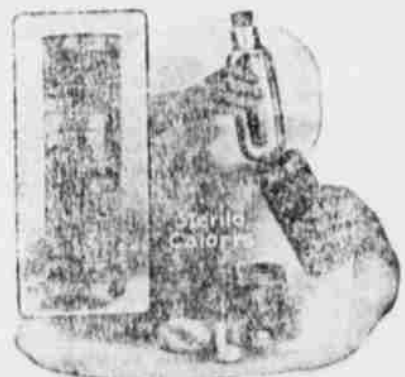
School House Addition
