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THE INCOME TAX

In view of the fact that the income tax question is one which is interesting the nation at present and one with which the members of the Oregon legislature will probably be called upon to grapple at the next legislative session, the following from the San Francisco Examiner is of interest. Alabama's endorsement of the income tax is now definitive. It has passed both houses of the legislature with absolute unanimity. This fact is phenomenal—a striking outward sign of a deep social conviction. And in contrast with the swift and spontaneous action of Alabama—the seeming reluctance of its neighbor, Georgia, is plainly seen to be the fabrication of a plutocratic lobby. The matter may be brought forward again in the Georgia legislature within a few days. But even if it goes over the present special session, the state will, in the ordinary course of its legislative events, have a chance to fall in line before many of the other states have voted. The same situation confronts the people of Washington, in which the state lower house has acted for the tax while the state is dilatory. The next state to face the issue is Illinois—a state regarded everywhere as especially representative of the Middle West. But unfortunately the legislature of Illinois does not represent the intelligence and virtue of the people. It is perhaps the most complete boss ruled legislature in the country. The income tax is as popular in Illinois as in Alabama. And the fight for it in the Illinois legislature next winter against the massed forces of plutocracy, and its Hessian policies promises to be a great sight. Most of the New England and middle states will also pass on the income tax next winter. And a victory in Illinois will be of strategic importance because of its influence upon the action of New England—where it is supposed, somewhat erroneously, that the politics of Illinois is representatively Western. The legislatures in most of the other states of the Union have biennial sessions—and generally in the odd numbered years. They will face the income tax amendment in 1911. It would seem that the Illinois legislature is appointed to hold the key of the plutocratic position. When the income tax shall have carried that rebout the triumph will be decisive.

He will not consent in the name of party loyalty to be sold out at every turn and made the chattel of corporations. Don't build too strongly on party name, gentlemen, in these practical days. You must back up the name with pledges and performances which the people demand. During the past week the settlers in the Fort Rock country have been burning sage brush.
