## LAW FOR PROTECTION AGAINST FOREST FIRES

### AN ACT

To provide for the protection of forests of the State of Oregon; to prevent, and suppress forest fires; to create a State Board of Forestry, to serve without compensation, which will investigate forest conditions and report thereon to the next legislature, and to repeal chapter two hundred and twenty-seven (227), General Laws of Oregon, as passed in 1900.

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. There shall be a State Board of Forestry, consisting of the Governor, Secretary of State, the State Forest, Fish and Game Warden, the member of the Oregon Agricultural College who has charge of its forest work, and three electors of the State of Oregon to be appointed by the Governor from and upon the authoritative recommendation of the Lumber Manufacturers' Association of Oregon, Oregon Forestry Association, and the United States Forestry Service, each to name and select one of such electors; in the absence of such recommendation the Governor shall nevertheless appoint such electors. The members of said board shall receive no compensation for their services thereon. The said board shall meet at the call of the Governor as soon as convenient after appointment, and shall organize by the election of chairman and secretary. A majority of said board shall constitute a quorum. Said board shall meet at any convenient place in the State at the call of the chairman, and the chairman shall call a meeting whenever requested to do so by a majority of the board.

Section 2. The State Board of Forestry shall investigate forest conditions of the State and report thereon to the next legislature, with recommendations for any further advisable legislation, for forest management and protection. It shall exercise all matters pertaining to forestry under the jurisdiction of the State, issue instructions regulating the duties of all State forest officers, use every practicable means to ensure the enforcement of laws relative to forest, brush and field fires, and give the fullest publicity to its facilities afford to the forest lands and the importance of forest protection. It shall be authorized to incur necessary expenses for stationery, postage, stenographic and similar facilities for records, correspondence and publicity of information, not to exceed the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00), and there is hereby appropriated the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for this purpose for the fiscal years of 1907 and 1908.

Section 3. Under such general policy as to qualifications numbers and localities as to the State Board of Forestry shall deem wise, it may appoint suitable and proper citizens State fire wardens who shall have all the powers given to fire wardens under this act who will serve without compensation. The board shall appoint any person as fire warden who shall be recommended by property owners or counties, provided that such property owners or counties shall pay such fire warden his compensation to be agreed upon. The president of the board shall appoint the last above named wardens immediately when requested to do so. State and county officials whose duties take them ex officio service as fire wardens especially desirable as convenience to the public shall accept appointments as such when formally requested by the State Board of Forestry. Upon the recommendation of the Federal Forest Supervisor, the board may appoint resident officers of the national forest reserves who shall be ex officio fire wardens.

Section 4. State fire wardens shall take proper steps for the prevention and extinguishment of fires within the localities in which they exercise their functions, assist in apprehending and convicting offenders against the fire laws, control the use of fire or clearing land in the close season as provided by section six (6) of this act by posting such prohibition in conspicuous places or otherwise, before departing from the place where such camp fires have been built, the builder of such fire totally extinguishes the same; and provided further, that nothing in this section shall apply of the setting of a back fire, in good faith, to prevent the progress of a fire then burning.

Section 5. Any person who builds a camp fire upon lands within this State, not his own, without clearing the ground immediately around it free from material which will carry fire, or who leaves a fire thereon a camp burning and unattended, or who permits a camp fire to spread theron, or who uses in any dreams discharged thereon other than incombustible gun wadding, shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty five dollars (\$25.00), nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00), and upon refusal or neglect to pay the fine and cost imposed shall be imprisoned for a period not to exceed one day for every two dollars thereof, or may be subject to both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.

Section 6. From June first to October first of each year it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to use any locomotive, logging engine, portable engine, traction engine or stationary engine using other fuel than oil, in or near forests or brush land which is not provided with an adequate spark arrester kept in constant use and repair. Any person, firm or corporation who shall fail to provide and use such spark arrester shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall pay a fine for each engine or locomotive without such spark arrester of not less than twenty five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and shall be enjoined from farther use of such engine or locomotive until such spark arrester is provided. Escape of fire from any engine shall be prima facie evidence that such appliance has not been adequately maintained in compliance with this section.

Section 7. All persons, firms or corporations engaged in logging, or permitting logging upon their lands, shall each year burn their annual slashing, by which is meant the lops and debris or inflammable refuse left

and make such reports upon their work and conditions within their jurisdiction as may be requested of the Board of Forestry. They shall have the powers of peace officers to make arrests for violations of forest laws. They shall have power to enter upon the lands of any person or owner in the discharge of their duties; provided, that in so entering they shall exercise due care to avoid doing damage. Any fire warden who has information which would show with reasonable certainty, that any person had violated a provision of the forest laws, shall immediately take action against the offender, either by using his own power as a peace officer or by making a complaint before the proper magistrate, or by the filing of information with the district attorney, and shall obtain all possible evidence thereon. Failure on the part of any fire warden receiving compensation to comply with the duties prescribed by this act shall be a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine not less than twenty dollars (\$20.00), nor more than two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00), or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than ten days nor more than three months, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 8. During the period between June 1st and October 1st which is herein designated the close season, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to set on fire or cause to be set on fire, any slashing, chopping, wood land or brush land, either his or their own or the property of another, without written or printed permission from a State fire warden and compliance with the terms thereof. This restriction shall not apply to the burning of log piles, stumps or brush heaps, in small quantities, at a safe distance from other inflammable material and under adequate precautions and personal control, and in accordance with regulations of said board; but if any such burning without permission shall result in the escape of fire and injury to the property of another, this shall be held prima facie evidence that such burning was not safe and was a violation of this section. Violation of these provisions shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty five dollars (\$25.00), nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or by imprisonment of not less than ten days nor more than three months. Permits to burn, as provided by this section, may be issued by any fire warden, and shall contain such restrictions as to time of burning and precautions to be taken as may be fixed by the State Board of Forestry or left by said board to the discretion of fire warden. Any fire warden shall have the right to refuse, revoke or suspend permits when it is clearly necessary for public safety. Any applicant dissatisfied with the decision of a State fire warden shall have the right of appeal to the State Board of Forestry. Any permit obtained through willful misrepresentation shall be invalid and give no exemption from liability of any kind.

Section 9. Any person who sets on fire or causes to be set on fire any woods, brush, grass, grain, stubble, or other material being or growing on any lands not his own, without the permission from the owner, or who wilfully or negligently allows fire to escape from his own land or another's and allows it to escape from his control with out extinguishing it, or using every effort to do so, shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00), nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00), or imprisonment for not less than one month nor more than one year; provided, that it shall be lawful to build, in a careful manner, camp fires on any enclosed lands, the owner of which has not torched such building of camp fires thereon by personal notice or by posting such prohibition in conspicuous places or otherwise, before departing from the place where such camp fires have been built, the builder of such fire totally extinguishes the same; and provided further, that nothing in this section shall apply of the setting of a back fire, in good faith, to prevent the progress of a fire then burning.


Section 10. Any person who sets on fire or causes to be set on fire any woods, forest, timber, brush or any vegetable matter whatever with the intent that the property of another shall be injured thereby, shall be guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the State penitentiary for not less than one or more than ten years.

Section 11. Any person who shall unlawfully or maliciously set fire to any woods, forest, timber, brush or any vegetable matter whatever with the intent that the property of another shall be injured thereby, shall be guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the State penitentiary for not less than one or more than ten years.

Section 12. In addition to the penalties provided in this act, the United States, State, county, or private owner whose property is injured or destroyed by such fires, may recover in a civil action the full amount of damages suffered if the fire occurred through willfulness, malice, or negligence, as determined by the value of the property injured or destroyed, and the detriment to the land and the vegetation thereof.

Section 13. Any person who shall detect any one violating any of the provisions of this act, and shall furnish information leading to the arrest and conviction of such person, shall receive upon his conviction one half of the fine paid by such person so convicted, and the balance shall go into the general fund of the county.

Section 14. The Secretary of State shall, upon request of State Board of Forestry, furnish such printed circulars and cloth notices and such forms and blanks as shall be necessary to carry out and give publicity to the provisions of this act, and said board shall provide for the proper distribution thereof. The cost of providing such circulars, cloth notices, forms and blanks to be paid from the appropriating for defraying the expenses of the public printing, binding etc., provided by the various State departments, boards commissions, etc. Any person who shall willfully destroy or injure any notice posted in compliance herewith shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than

fifty dollars (\$50.00), or by imprisonment for one day for each two dollars of such fine imposed in case of his neglect or refusal to pay such fine.

Section 15. That chapter two hundred and twenty seven (227), General Laws of Oregon, session 1900, and all other acts or parts of acts in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.
