ALL NIGHT SALE IN AUCTION TENT

By the unanimous vote of the delegates yesterday it was decided by contract holders to hold all night sales in the auction tent until the land has all been sold.

Many of the visitors are anxious to get away Saturday and Sunday if possible and such is possible only by holding all night sales. Auctioneer Powers agreed to the plan and last night's experiment was entirely satisfactory.

It is probable that there will be tent sessions to night and Friday, indications are that every parcel of land will be disposed of by Saturday forenoon.

That will mean that practically all of the visiting land owners will be out of Lakeview by Sunday. About half have already left for their homes.

For several days every vehicle that could be obtained by the Oregon Valley Land company has been pressed into service and hundreds have taken the overland trip of 60 miles to Alturas.

MADE A LONG AUTO TRIP

Frank Reynolds and wife, came all the way from Butte, Montana, in a "Pratt", high-wheeled auto, 1300 miles. It took 18 days travel. Mr. Reynolds was here last fall, and will return to locate permanently in the spring.
