HILL PLANS EAST AND WEST LINES

Looks As Though Prineville and Burns Will Get a Road

The railroad Kaleidoscope presents still another view this week and it now looks as though Prineville and Burns also are to be placed on the railroad map.
The Prineville Review of the 2d inst says that a man who arrived at Prineville Monday from the Dalles at the request of the Porter Bros., contractors for James A. Hill, gave the information that he is going to work for the Porter in Crooked River Valley, and that the route contemplated by Hill involved a road from Madras to Burns, thence to the Lakeview country and on to Sao Francisco. The man was most positive in his statements that Prineville is to have a railroad, in spite of the fact that there has never been a railroad surveyor's stake driven in the valley.

The news caused a small flurry here, the people of Prineville not having become accustomed to hear railroad talk in connection with their home town. If the man's assertions are correct, Hill's plans of building south of Bond are carefully making his possible future operations here while a sufficient crew of engineers accumulate to map out the line between this city and Burns. At any rate if the statement proves to be correct Prineville will know it within a week, as Hill takes no time when he starts upon a project.

In the meantime, however, Hill's engineers are strung along the upper Deschutes for a good hundred miles, even as far south as Odell, indicating that a route to California is contemplated. Actual construction, it is said, has begun by Hill's forces at Trail Crossing, and surveys are being made south of that point. The man giving the information says that Hill intends to start at Trail and come up Crooked River Valley and that the surveys are to be made immediately. His forces are at Trail now, making out plans for a huge bridge to span the gulch at that point, similar to the one contemplated by Harriman forces.

If Mr. Hill or Stevens, decides to come to Crooked River Valley, he will have little to do beyond securing the right of way and laying ties and rails.

The valley is the finest water-grade to be found anywhere, practically level as a floor for more than a hundred miles. There is little grading to be done, and once the survey is completed track could be laid at the rate of three miles a day.

HOW TO SECURE 320-ACRE FARM Provisions of the Law for Securing Desert Homestead

In view of the interest that is being taken in Lakeview regarding the land known locally as the High Desert, The Examiner gives below the chief features of the law which allows an entryman to file on 320 acres, most of the land referred to being filed upon under this act. The clipping appended was taken from the Pacific Monthly:
"Under the terms of the Mondell farming law, passed at the last session of Congress, the homesteader is allowed to take 320 acres of land under certain restrictions. First, the land must be in the states or territories of Oregon, Washington, Utah, Wyoming, New Mexico, Nevada, Arizona, Colorado or Montana. Further, the land must have been designated as non-irrigable. In order to make the law operative at once, answering the demands of the many in the west who wished to take advantage of its provisions in the west, Secretary Ballinger has recently designated over 175,000,000 acres of western land open to settlement under the provisions of this new law. He has designated about three and one half million acres as being open in Washington, seven millions each in Oregon and Utah, nine millions in Wyoming, fourteen in New Mexico, nineteen in Montana, twenty in Colorado, twenty-six in Arizona and forty nine million acres in Nevada. Doubtless these areas will be added to from time to time as the line of settlement pushes up to the limits fixed.
"It will be remembered that according to the provisions of the Mondell law, the land seeker must be a resident of the state in which the land is located. Also he must live continuously on the land as designated in the well known homestead law. It is further provided that one eighth of the land selected must be cultivated by the second year, and that one fourth of the whole tract must be continuously cultivated the third year. The land must be in a compact body, and it is allowed that those who have previously filed on the regulation 160 acres may increase their holdings by the addition of land, bringing the total up to not more than 320 acres."
