PAISLEY AND SUMMER LAKE

At the meeting of the Moss Telephone company stockholders held in Paisley last week the following were elected directors for the following year: Dick Wilcox, Lakeview; S. P. Dicks, Crooked Creek; S. P. Moss, L. A. Moss, Dr. A. A. Witham, T. W. Johnson, Paisley; W. K. McCormack, Summer Lake. S. P. Moss is president, Dr. Witham vice president, Mr. Wilcox, treasurer and L. A. Moss, secretary. The line was divided up into three districts for the purpose of keeping it in repair. Mr. Wilcox and Mr. Dicks have charge of the south end, S. P. Moss and Mr. Johnson the middle section, and Dr. Witham and Mr. McCormack the north end. Mr. McCormack was appointed a committee of one to arrange to reconnect the line at White Hill with the Summer Lake line to Silver Lake.

Representative Brattain is visiting at Springfield over in Lane county and will be home about the first of November.

There is a report that the Williams have taken an option on the 50,000 acres of ZX ranch and the Brattain and the George Jones holdings, but it has not been confirmed. T. J.
