Several important new strikes have been made in the Hong district within the past two months, this together with the splendid showing in the properties under development and the fact that a 30 ton capacity custom mill is now being installed, makes the prospect for the season 1910 a very flattering one.

The Hong district will add materially to the sum of California's gold production.

In doing the yearly assessment work on the Harry Hill claim by Walter Sherlock and others of Altus, a good strong vein of milling ore was discovered.
