The Proposed New State of Siskiyou May not be a Dream

Some time since the Examiner advocated the idea of Eastern Oregon seceding from Western Oregon, in order to get away from that delectable bunch at Portland. The matter was considerably discussed by the State Press at the time.

Since then another project has been brought to the front, to establish what is to be known as the State of Siskiyou, embracing the territory within the counties of Douglas, Coos, Curry, Josephine, Klamath and Lake in Oregon and Del Norte, Humboldt, Siskiyou, Modoc, Trinity, Shasta, Tehama and Lassen in California.

The movement originated in Yreka, with the avowed purpose of making that town the capital of the new State. But as to that the Dorris, Booster says:

"The idea of Yreka as the capital of the state is untenable. We believe the new state is a good idea and believe it will materialize sooner or later we also believe the capital will be either Medford or Klamath Falls; Medford if the event takes place soon and Klamath Falls a better show the longer it is delayed."

There is much to be said in favor of the proposed state. The pursuits of the people within the districts named are homogenous, and their isolation at present from the domination of the rotten political centers of Portland and San Francisco, would free them from any sentiment of being longer bound to such influences.

The State of Siskiyou may yet become a new and bright star in the firmament of our Union.

COUNTY NEWS

PAISLEY AND SUMMER LAKE

While in Portland C. W. Withers called in at the office of the Portland Irrigation Company. Mr. Bell was not in but the man in charge spoke very confidently of the situation. He said that applications had been received for all the land segregated and that work on the irrigation plant would start before long. This is the same story that has been told before, in the meantime the people of Paisley are going ahead with their petitions. Practically everybody has signed them. In view of the fact that a primary election is coming on next spring it is not believed the state land board will care to give another extension of time. If the board decides against the company it must give written notice and it within two months the Portland Irrigation company does not resume work its contract is forfeited. But if it does resume work with two men grubbing machinery, what then? Is the contract called for a fourth of the work to be completed September 15th, 1909, and the contract might be annulled on that ground. It is not impossible that the Portland Irrigation company will put on a large force of men before its two months is up. At any rate there will be something going.
