COUNTY NEWS

PAISLEY AND SUMMER LAKE

For the past month the Paisley Flour mills have been grinding out flour from the hundred tons of wheat bought by George Conn early in the fall. This 200,000 pounds of wheat will be sufficient to supply the entire community for many miles around.

Do the people of Paisley appreciate the advantage of having a flour mill right at home? Intimes past they have shipped in flour from Shaniko and from Goose Lake and have paid as much for it besides the long freight haul as Mr. Conn now charges for flour right in Paisley. The price of flour in Lakeview is \$3.50 a hundred and it is \$3.50 a hundred in Paisley. George Conn is one of Lake county's most progressive and highly respected citizens and he deserves much praise for his enterprise in investing \$16,000 in a flour mill for the benefit of the people of Cheaucan basin. Perhaps this large capital has not always yielded the remuneration that it should and Mr. Conn has always deserved a larger patronage than he has received. But aside from making a profit on his flour to which he is justly entitled Mr. Conn cares more for the love and respect of his neighbors. This is why he is selling flour as cheap at home as it can be purchased on the outside. And this is why the people all say of George Conn that he is a man whose word is as good as his bond.

Considering the high price of wheat and the high price of every thing else in this isolated country the people are very fortunate to get flour for \$3.50 a hundred. Mr. Conn pays \$1.50 for wheat. After taking out the millers wages, paying taxes and interest and considering the limited trade, there is but a small profit left and this in a country where a merchant is legitimately entitled to a profit of 100 per cent on his goods.

However while selling flour at \$3.50 a hundred for the accommodation of the people, Mr. Conn has for several reasons found it necessary to limit purchases. He restricts the amount each family can buy to one 50-pound sack at a time and to one sack a month. This rule applies to all people living within a radius of twenty miles of Paisley. Perhaps a farmer living as far away as Silver Lake who needs three or four days to make a trip to the mill at some expense, it he puts up the right kind of talk, might be allowed to purchase more than one sack.

If it necessary, as has been stated, to do this for several reasons. Mr. Hammersley, who he is a good miller, is essentially slow, and anyway he cannot run the mill any faster than the water will turn the wheels. If the handicap of one sack a month was not enforced it is feared that some one might try to hog the supply when the desire is to have the flour apportioned out all around. And four this has been stored a while in the grist mill makes better bread. As before mentioned Mr. Conn cares more for the reputation of his flour among the people than for the profits on his goods.

Moreover, there are people so mean that if allowed to buy all the flour they want to try and corner the market and as soon as the roads got bad would raise the price of the product to fabulous figures. Mr. Conn proposes to see that this is not done. His motto is live and let live, and he intends to see that the cost of flour is kept within reasonable bounds.

Any man living within twenty miles of Paisley should visit town once a month anyway. He may see something in the stores that he wants to buy. If he makes the excuse that the roads get bad in the winter this is not Mr. Conn's fault. He should kick to the county court and get good roads. Mr. Conn is strictly honorable in all his dealings and those who call him "Boss" behind his back should remember the fate of the little boy that mocked the prophet.
