**PLAT FILED FOR OREGON TRUNK**

Plats were filed in the U. S. Land Office, at Lakeview, Tuesday, locating the Oregon Trunk Line, which is surveyed to some point below Odel in Klamath county, where it will intersect the Center Lake road now building from Medford. It is understood that this line is to be built first in order to reach the timber holdings of the Weyerhaeuser syndicate situated in Northern Klamath.

The construction of this branch line of the Hill system will in no way interfere with the building of the main line of that road through Silver Lake, Summer Lake, Paisley, Lakeview and New Pine Creek, and on down the Pitt river to San Francisco.
