FUN IN SHADOW BUFF.

A Game For a Party That May Be Made Highly Amusing.
Shadow buff is a game of great originality and may be made productive of much amusement. A smooth white sheet is hung against the wall, and near to this on a low stool is seated the victim of the moment, who, in this case, is not blindfolded, but is bound by the severest penalties to look only toward the sheet and not on any pretense to turn his head. On a table at a little distance behind him is placed the most powerful lighted lamp available, all other lights being extinguished. The company now pass in suc-

cession before the light, but behind buff, so that their shadows are cast upon the sheet. As soon as he succeeds in guessing the identity of any particular shadow the owner of that shadow takes his place.
It should be understood that it is quite allowable to increase the difficulty of guessing by the assumption of any available disguise, so long as it does not conceal the whole person. Any amount of grimacing is also permissible.

Where there are folding doors it is a good plan to hang the sheet in the opening and to place buff in the one room and the remaining players in the other. Our illustration depicts this form of the game, but being supposed to be on the other side of the sheet and therefore invisible—Philadelphia Ledger.

HOUSE BUILT IN A TREE.

Queer Residence of an American Living in Nicaragua.

Years ago a Louisiana planter, aptly named Wildeson, went to establish himself on the Rama river in Nicaragua, where he raises bananas and rubber trees with profit, says the Chicago News. A Mr. Drew who visited him on business describes his three-story house as literally built in a tree, a sturdy cypress tree, sixty-three feet from the ground.

To get up and down between the ground and the house an elevator is used, so constructed with block and tackle that the person using it raises himself or controls his descent by means of a rope.

There is also a chicken house suspended from a limb, into which the poultry is collected at night. After a day of free picking and strolling the feathered bipeds come of themselves to be raised to their roost.

Still, while they're little I don't put temptation in his way, but keep them in a snake-tight coop of wire netting."
