When the following proceedings were had to wit:

In the matter of the establishment of a Road District to be known as the Lake Road District, No. 13. Out of territory embraced in Road District No. 12 and changing the name and number thereof to Lake Road District No. 13.

It appearing to the satisfaction of this Court, after a careful investigation of all the facts relating thereto that for the better convenience of the people residing at or near the Post Office of Lake, Lake County, Oregon, that a Road District should be established, to conform to the boundary lines of the Voting Precinct heretofore established at that place: It is hereby ordered considered and adjudged that a Road District be and the same is hereby established, and that the said Road District shall be known as Lake Road District No. 13, and bounded as follows:

Beginning at the Northeast corner of Lake County, Oregon, thence West along the North boundary line of said County to the Northeast corner of T. 24, S. R. 16, E. W. M.; thence South on the Range line between Ranges 16 and 17, E. W. M. to the Southeast corner of T. 25, S. R. 16, E. W. M.; thence West on the Township line between Townships 25 and 26 to the Northeast corner of T. 26, S. R. 15, E. W. M.; thence South on the Range line between Ranges 15 and 16, E. W. M. to the Southeast corner of T. 27, S. R. 15, E. W. M.; thence East, on the Township line between Township 27 and 28, a distance of three miles; thence South on the Section line a distance of nine miles; thence East on the Section line to the East boundary line of Lake County, Oregon; thence North on the East boundary line of Lake County Oregon, to the place of beginning.

That the said Lake Road District No. 13 in Lake County, Oregon shall be for all purposes whatsoever a distinct and separate Road District as are all other Road Districts of Lake County Oregon and the boundaries of all Road Districts of said County, which are effected by the creation of said Lake Road District No. 13 out of the territory embraced in Road District No. 12, and changing the name and number thereof to Lake Road District No. 13, shall be and the same are hereby established.

It is further ordered that the construction work, and the establishment of the same are hereby begun in earnest.

been famous since its fertile beauty was first beheld by General John C. Fremont. The valley is approximately 100 miles in length, and stretches out in a wide plain. It is so sheltered by the mountains that it has a climate all of its own. It is mild in the winter and not too hot in the summer. It is some 700 feet lower altitude than the Golden Goose Lake Valley, and thus escapes the early and late frosts that sometimes occur in certain parts of this section at higher altitudes.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Senator Bourne, as chairman of the subcommittee of the Senate public expenditures committee, believes there is need of investigating Congressional investigations. He has been looking up the cost of the investigation, ordered by Congress 1907, of what caused the advance in the price of timber. This has already cost upwards of \$200,000 and is not completed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 7.—Senator Chamberlain has introduced a bill for the protection of water power sites, the purpose being to prevent private corporations from obtaining permanent title to them. The bill in all details agrees with the Roosevelt power site policy. It provides for leases for thirty years and application fee of 10 cents per horse power, and an established water fund; and an annual license of from one-half of 1 per cent to 1 per cent of the gross receipts, readjustable at the end of each ten-year period.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—"We have already discovered that the farmer is not getting the exorbitant profits out of the beef he raises," said Secretary Wilson, in discussing the high price of food supplies today. "I have no doubt," he concluded, "that the same conditions prevail in most other lines of farm products. The Department of Agriculture will thoroughly investigate conditions and tell the truth, no matter how it hurts."
