The ice jam in the Chewaucan at Paisley grows daily more alarming. Every street in town the past week has been flooded and blocked with ice. Nearly all of the resident district have moved to new quarters and those who can get away have gone into the country to wait till the river subsides.

Lloyd Woodward started for Lakeview last Saturday to make yearly proof on his desert. His witnesses were E. C. Woodward and your correspondent. Reports from the river the day before were discouraging and they went by way of Valley Falls.

The river is now running on the south side of town. Main street was flooded to its full length. This water came into the hardware room of the Ainsworth store. It was within about a foot of getting into Conn's store. The ice froze solid the fore part of the week and teams easily reached the bridge. Friday, the 7th, the wind began to soften the ice and several teams to try to reach the bridge broke through.

The northern has not yet missed a trip. It is sometimes a little late in getting out of Paisley. But by running the wagon over by hand and leading the horses across it has been able to maintain its schedule.

The stage to Lakeview has the water to contend with in entering from the south.

The ford above town is shut off by four feet of water running down the street by the Mercantile store.

George Hannan said he didn't have to move but he thought he might as well as the ice was fourteen inches thick over his floors.

County Judge Daly wrote up to Road Supervisor McCormack to repair the road at the bridge. But there is nothing that can be done while the flood lasts. It is impracticable to get dirt from the frozen ground. The brush that was put in the last December went out with the next overflow.

The first week of January was the coldest since a record was started six years ago at the Woodward Hot Springs. The low temperatures were 13 above 1 below, 9 below, 3 above 2 below, 3 above, 28 above. The maximum temperatures were 27, 15, 12, 22, 16, 34, 35. Thus it is seen there was no thawing except the last two days of the week.

If the water is backed up much more it will reach the Bagley ditch and flood the ranchers on the south side.
