By THOMAS R. SHIPP, Secretary of the National Conservation Commission. HE PEOPLE OF THE COUNTRY ARE FOR THE CONSERVA-TION MOVEMENT AND ARE READY FOR THE SPECIFIC APPLICATION OF CONSERVATION PRINCIPLES BY THE STATES AND THE NATIONAL GOVERNMENT.

As a general principle conservation has been practically UNAN-IMOUSLY INDORSED, but universal indorgement without the practical application of conservation principles is

dangerous to the success of the movement. PRAC-TICAL APPLICATION MUST NOW BE THE

Of course there are powerful interests which, for obvious reasons, will be opposed to such practical application, but these interests do not represent the SENTIMENT OF THE PEOPLE. I have visited certain western states in which opposition to conservation has been loudly expressed through certain controlled mediums, yet I have found that in these very states, if the issue could be left to a popular vote, conservation policies WOULD WIN BY AN OVER-

WHELMING MAJORITY.
