The People are the Real Insurgents and are Risen Against Selfish Control of The Government By Cohorts of "Big Business"

(From La Follette's Weekly.)

La Follette was established to aid in bringing government back to the People. For years wealth in combination has ruled in Congress and in the Capitals of the country. The vote of the citizen is nullified by legislation enacted at the behest of Special Interest. The People are sacrificed to party solidarity.

March, 4th, President Roosevelt committed the great work of his administration, finished and unfinished, to his successor President Taft. Taft formed a new cabinet, some of whom had not been in sympathy with that work. He aided in the election of Cannon as Speaker of the House of Representatives. Cannon, Aldrich and their associates, became his close advisers on legislation. It was a bad beginning. It has borne bitter fruit in tariff revision upward, with advancing price already productive of popular revolt.

It has brought upon the Administration in its first year charges against the Secretary of the Interior in connection with the coal land steal of a magnitude unparalleled in the history of public plundering. The people are not satisfied with the tariff legislation. They were shocked at the charges made in the Alaskan coal scandal.

They have not lost faith yet. They are still waiting—hoping.

But the people of the country are progressive—not as well as the West. They will tolerate no retreat or halt or compromise of progressive policies.

La Follette will support the President in every effort which he puts forth to secure legislation in the public interest.

We, too, are waiting—hoping. Out

of the stirring events of the year—out of the fight for the Speakership and the House rules; out of the invasion of the West by Aldrich and Cannon; out of the sugar trust disclosures; out of the fight to protect public lands from private monopolies; out of the passage of the new tariff law—out of these has developed Insurgency—the insurgency of The People of the United States, wherever it appears that progressive policies are in danger; insurgency against the selfish control of government by big business. Government by The People is stronger in the Senate and in the House of Representatives to-day than it was a year ago.

It will be stronger a year hence. Between now and next November a new Congress must be elected. The fight will be carried into every Congressional District—to your very doors. The outcome of these contests will depend upon the part you play in them. It will determine the advance made in the year 1910 in the movement to restore a People's Government.

Every State is calling for men—real men who are not afraid. You will have a hand in your own contest. It will be a hard fight in every District, in every State. The System is desperate. Its very existence depends upon the outcome.

The merger of the Harriman lines is to be dissolved. The agitation of the railroad question through the press and the magazines seems to have had its effect, and the President has advised the heads of "the big business," that it is a choice between regulation or government ownership.

The Post-office Department Deficit, and the Real Cause of the Same is Known, and Should at Once be Stopped!

The annual deficit in the post office department of the nation seems to be disconcerting to the administration and is somewhat disquieting to what Mr. Roosevelt designated as the predatory interests!

The murmur of discontent, heard from the people and the fearless press of the land, has brought out statements from the President and his master general attributing various causes as the reason of the shortage.

The rural free mail delivery, one of the greatest pieces of legislation ever promulgated for the benefit of the farming class and which is a real blessing to them, is assigned as one of the alleged causes. If they dared the predatory barons, would stop that service at once. But there are too many votes there which, once aroused, would put a stop to all of the leaks that are never whispered about by the authorities or by the well-conducted trust-owned newspapers.

Probably the meanest, lowest dirtiest explanation for this disgraceful, shameless shortage is the charge that is due to the "subsidizing" of the paper and the magazines by affording them a low rate for postage. This attack is particularly virulent upon the magazines.

Why?

Simply because the magazines, almost universally, are fighting for equity in politics, and against the odious Money Power and its slimy trail of graft and pollution with the effect that the people have become awakened as to the universal corruption of such influences and are no longer to be held by the party whip or fetter to do the bidding of the political bosses who play into the rapacious hands of the interests, no

matter whether entrenched in the republican or the democratic parties, and who by shouts of "party loyalty," "party solidarity," and "you must not disturb business," rob and dispoil the people with impunity and immunity from all law that seeks to curb them or bring them to justice!

The Money power knows the power of an honest and forceful press and of the virile patriotic magazines too well as an educational factor to curb and eventually do away with their plundering of the masses, and for that reason cunningly urge upon their tools in congress the employment of the post office deficit as a sure means to bring about the downfall of the magazines, or at least to cripple their usefulness to the common people by compelling them, in order to exist to make their prices so high as to place them beyond the reach of the poorer people and thereby at a stroke remove their educational influence from the majority of the voters!

In this endeavor to cover up and mystify the fact as to a big stealing, the real cause of the deficit is not at all touched upon by the congressional gas-bags nor by the partizan daily press, which is nothing more nor less than the payment to the railroad systems of the land the most extravagant rates for Carriage of mails which in reality is nothing short of downright robbery and should place both the government authorities and the railroad men who are parties to the steal in the penitentiary for the term of their natural lives! Especially is this robbery all the more intolerable, when a similar service in Mexico, and other enlightened governments is performed free of cost by the railroads!

While the government is being robbed by the railroads for carrying

the mails with the result of a shortage the last year of \$17,000,000, the Express Companies are waxing fat over their contracts with railroads for a similar service and such men as that villainous "me too" Senator Platt, of New York holds his place in the senate for the express purpose of preventing legislation that will give the people in this country a parcels post, which is now in vogue in every civilized country, except this trust ridden United States! The Kansas City Star, which has no agencies of being other than a "good" republican paper, says in this connection:

The Star pays a express company a half a cent a pound for transporting its papers to agents. Presumably the express companies find the rate profitable. Why should it cost the government eighteen times as much, even though its machinery of delivery must be increased to handle the second-class matter. Possibly the amount of the postal deficit might be saved by making better contracts with railroads for the transportation of mail.

In the above the Star hits the President and his postmaster general a hard rap, by their falsely ascribing the deficit to be due to the free rural mail as the cost of carriage of magazines and newspapers in the mails.

The President, and his fast-frying postmaster general do not seem to know, or else wilfully ignore the fact that the government is paying \$90,000,000 a year for service that is performed by the railroads for express companies at one eighth less the cost!

If the government was as well favored as the express companies by the railroads instead of a deficit of \$17,000,000, the earnings of the post office department would show a profit of \$40,000,000!

In this statement of outrageous robbery of the people and then attempting to cover it up by another attempt to defraud the public do you see any of these facts in your Oregonian, your San Francisco Chronicle or any of the other trust-ridden papers of the land?

No! and what is more you never will!

You probably will continue to read them and imagine you are being fed the truth—as to public matters!

The Sacramento Bee, however more honest and patriotic than some of its compeers in its discussion of this question very pointedly and pertinently asks:

Why do not the President and his Postmaster General get down to the root of this trouble? Why so silent concerning the fact that while a postal car costs but \$3,500 to build the railroads charge Uncle Sam an average of \$6,065.05 annually for the rental of each car; and this entirely independent of the charges of handling?

Why do they keep from the general public such potent facts as that on the New York Central the swindling outrage goes even further; that in one year recently that road collected \$10,456.07 rental for each of twenty two mail cars running between New York and Buffalo, or \$230,033.60 in all; and that it taxed Uncle Sam in addition that year \$1,238,080.41 for transporting mails?

The whole matter of postoffice deficit simmers itself down to the fact that the insatiable greed of the railroad owners alone is the cause of the postal deficit!

Out out that graft.

My Dear Mr. Taft! and establish the parcels post, and postal savings banks, but let the rural free delivery and the magazines and newspapers alone, and it is perfectly clear that instead of a deficit there would be a profit in the postoffice department.

The voters, too, Mr. Taft, are thinking these things, and what they think is not all complimentary to you as the business head of this Nation, especially so, when you permit this stealing to go on unchecked, and in face of well known facts to the contrary, make the attempt to attribute such shortage to causes foreign to the real one!

It will not do, Mr. Taft!

The Ontario Optimist advocates the taxing of vacant lots, held for speculative purposes in a larger proportionate ratio than should be done with property that is improved. The Examiner is inclined to think that is sound logic. The Optimist says there are 3000 lots in that town owned in Spokane, Seattle and other cities, held solely for speculation that do not now bear their just share of the burdens of taxation.

The Reno Journal wants to know: What has become of the one time slogan, "the full dinner pail?" With present wages, and present prices for necessities, the contents of the "full dinner pail" has dwindled to a scanty crust, and there are vast armies of honest men who have not even that while the trusts are rolling up millions that were never earned by honest effort, but by iniquitous favoritism, under the guise of "protection for infant industries."

The Tri-State farmers who met the 17th inst, to the number of 900, at Walla Walla, on the question of extension of rural mail routes, parcel post and magazine postal rates. In the last three subjects they take a stand directly opposed to the recommendation of President Taft.
