**N. C. O. SUING LAUERS FOR RIGHT OF WAY**

ALTURAS, Modoc Co., Jan., 21.—Some time ago an action was brought in the Superior Court of Modoc County by the Nevada, California Oregon Railway Company to condemn the right of way for the railroad across the land of E. Lauer and sons. The attorney for the defendant filed a demurrer to the complaint, alleging defect in the manner and form of the action.  
 To-day Judge John E. Baker of the Superior Court overruled the demurrer in every count and gave the attorney for defendant ten days to answer.

**New Telephone Rates**

After March 1st, 1910 the California and Oregon Telegraph Co. are to make many reductions on tariff over their wires, among them we notice they are to reduce the rate from Lakeview and New Pine Creek to Reno, Nev., of forty cents for ten words and three cents each additional word, present rates 50 cents and 3. Through rate to Frisco and all points taking Frisco tariff will be eighty cents and to all telegraphic points in state of Oregon, one dollar including Klamath Falls.  
 Rate to Alturas will be reduced to 25 and 2. This is owing to increase in business over their wires.  
 It has always been the policy of this company to reduce tolls as fast as the business would warrant.
