**Mail Contracts Let**

The contracts for carrying the mails between here and Klamath Falls, on the Western Stage route, then between Alturas and Lakeside over the Southern line and the Plush route to the East have all been let to P. M. Cory of Lakeview. Sol Chamberlain has secured the Northern line contract and each of these gentlemen will immediately start to improve the service in the matter of providing new stage equipment to anticipate the heavy movement of passengers and teams that will come with the spring rush. The contracts are to run four years and it is expected that with a consideration of these lines the service will be as good if not better than on any similar line in the West.
