### Taxes Now Due

Books at the sheriff's office are now  
open for the collection of taxes which

"Nor I don't want you to do that, my son. I'll put you on the regular police force."

"And kin I have a star?"

"Yes, I'll give you a badge," said the chief.

"All right. I'm wild yet," answered Jimmie, who was then and there sworn in as a special policeman—an act which immediately made him a good citizen.
