## SAN FRANCISCO LETTER

San Francisco, Cal., February, 1910  
Editor Examiner:

San Francisco and Oakland, neighboring cities facing on the bay, remain one, in a family. The one stays in the parlor and "comes off" before company, encouraged by fond and admiring parents, while the other is "bustled off" to bed, and is neither seen, nor heard of any more that evening.

No city, in the United States is better known, or more extensively advertised, than the Pacific Coast Metropolis. While Oakland across the bay is almost entirely unadvertised, goes quietly on, growing steadily and unobtrusively.

There is no city in the country, which possesses a business street, cleaner kept, better paved, better lighted, than Washington Street Oakland, and to walk from East Oakland, to the extreme end of West Oakland would take fully two hours, as most people can walk three miles an hour there must be six miles of city, from East to West. Oakland has so completely merged itself with the University town of Berkeley, that it is difficult to determine where the one ends and the other begins.

The large, always green, lawns, the beautiful rows of trees lining the streets, give a quiet, restful, home-like air to Oakland, which San Francisco, with its miles of houses, sidewalks, and crowded streets, can never under the present conditions hope to possess. Of course, the enormous loss of property, to the fire of

April 1906—there were 28000 houses burnt at that time—causes many cheerless desolate spots in the Metropolis.

Oakland's population is 22,000 and on the upward trend. Whether or not it will at some future day, pass the destiny of Brooklyn, N. Y., can be ascertained by its sister city, something for the prophet to determine. Every kind of business, in these days, seems to lead toward consolidation or trusts. The American Cigar Co., a gigantic trust, has its retail department, for United Cigar Stores, which are located in great numbers, in all large cities, from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean. There are a great many of these in San Francisco.

I am acquainted with a well-to-do fellow over sixty years of age, who has lost one limb—the result of a railroad accident—and goes about on crutches. Before the earthquake and fire of 1906 he was doing a flourishing business, in a little retail cigar stand. Of course the calamity threw him out of business. Why don't he now go back again to the same work? He cannot, for the stores, of the huge tobacco trust sell to the public, at a price, which he cannot possibly do, and live. He is driven to the wall, too old to be hired, he must get along somehow, if he can. This is only one case in many.

Who says, that life is not full of tragedy? It is not necessary to have a Shakespeare in these days. Daily events are a sufficiently instructive theatre.

## LIMBERING STIFF JOINTS.

How This Distress May Be Relieved by Simple Remedies.

The old remedy, beloved of our grandfathers—grease—is still considered an excellent cure for stiff joints. Probably the friction and hard rubbing have more to do with the cure than the special variety of grease, and if the grease product is not at hand hot vaseline, lard and turpentine mixed, and even hot olive oil, are excellent lubricants.

If the stiff joints come from rheumatism, internal remedies should be taken as well. Lithia water will counteract the first tendencies, but should the pains continue it is best to consult a physician.

Stiffness arise from over-exercise, before rubbing with grease take a bath as hot as one can bear it. A few handfuls of rock salt added will heighten the good effects.

After the greasing special exercise for the joints affected help in the limbering process. If the shoulders are stiff, for instance, try the circular head and shoulder movements, first to the right, later to the left. The lower part of the body can be quickly limbered by raising the hands over the head and bending over them to the floor, thus bringing into play all the waist muscles.

A stiff knee should be rubbed with a circular movement, and the lower part of the leg should be slowly moved backward and forward. Any of these exercises may seem somewhat painful at first, but will give relief if persevered in.

### How to Blow a Nose Scientifically.

Medical experts are calling the attention of the public to the importance of performing the nose blowing operation in a scientific and hygienic manner. First one nostril and then the other should be blown without undue violence. Doctors state that the two nasal passages should never be closed at the same time. If they are obstructed, as in the case of a cold, the back of the throat is filled with compressed air, and this, together with the discharge and the microbes which it contains, may be driven through the eustachian tube into the middle ear and lead to serious results. A great authority on the subject used to forbid his patients to blow their noses when suffering from a cold. This course is hardly one which will commend itself to those in the habit of catching colds. The best advice would seem to be that when it is necessary to blow the nose the blowing should be done gently.

### How to Make Cheese Straws.

To make cheese straws put two ounces of flour into a basin, with a good seasoning of salt and cayenne; add to these two ounces of grated Parmesan cheese. When these are mixed together rub into them lightly two ounces of butter, then mix the whole to a stiff paste with the beaten yolk of an egg and a little water if necessary. Roll out the pastry till it is an eighth of an inch thick. Then cut it into straws about an eighth of an inch wide and three or four inches long. Lay these on a baking tin (which need not be greased) and bake them in a slow oven until they are a delicate brown. These straws require very gentle handling, as they break so easily.

### How to Roast Meat.

Put the roast in the pan free from seasoning and flour. When sufficiently cooked pour off every particle of grease from the pan and rub two tablespoonfuls of flour into the brown substance left in bottom of pan. Pour over this one pint of cold water, put over the fire and cook until it thickens, stirring constantly to prevent lumping. Season with salt and pepper and strain into a gravy boat. For chicken gravy a half cup of rich cream is a great addition. Gravies made thus are free from grease, which is so harmful to delicate stomachs.

Following out a plan of Archbishop O'Connell of Boston, the music at the funerals of priests in the future will consist of Gregorian chants, sung by other clergymen.
