Alturas Getting Dry?

Alturas seems to be all torn up over the saloon question. Some are in favor of ousting the saloons at once. Others, comprising the Good Government Club, are in favor of gradual cessation of the business under a restrictive ordinance to take effect July 1st, 1910, limiting the number of licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors in any quantity, issued under authority of said board to three, said licenses to be put up at public auction and sold to the highest acceptable bidder for the same, no bid, however to be accepted for a sum of less than \$50.00 per month, payable quarterly in advance, said three licenses to be limited, without privilege of renewal, to the following terms respectively, one license for the term of twelve months, and one license for the term of eighteen months, sufficient bonds to be given by the purchaser of said licenses for the conduct of their business in a legal manner. Thereafter no license for the sale of intoxicating liquor in the town of Alturas shall be issued.

There is a further proviso, that the hours of sale shall be restricted, and that all games of chance played with cards, dice or any other device, for anything of value, be prohibited and that a suitable ordinance be passed making it a misdemeanor for any person to appear on any public street or public place, in a drunken or intoxicated condition and that saloons shall have no club rooms or back rooms attached thereto or run in connection therewith.

The prohibition question seems to have suddenly become prominent in Alturas, and it is charged that the lawless acts of the saloonmen there have aroused public sentiment against the saloon element.

In this latter respect the saloonmen of Lakeview have been careful to keep within the limits of the law and for that reason as yet there has been no general talk of making this town dry.

It is entitled "The Religion of a Nation" and is a terrific arraignment of the doings of the predatory rascals of wealth who are despoiling the richest nation on earth for their own personal aggrandizement!
