SUCCESS IS TO BE HAD IN DRY FARMING

What is Said as to Results in Harney, Applies with Greater Force to Lake County

One of the foremost surveyors in our county and one in position to know, informs us that there are thousands of acres of rich sage brush land in the famous Catlow valley that are waiting for the hardy homesteader.

Thousands of acres are vacant government land with sage-brush growing from one inch in diameter to 12 inches, that will undoubtedly raise the finest winter wheat in the world, without irrigation.

This man has been over the valley many times and stands sponsor for the statement that it is destined to be an important wheat area. It is certain that wherever sage-brush grows of such immense proportions, wheat will also grow.

But on this whole subject of crop production in Central Oregon, nothing better offered than a statement made by L. S. Greer of Burns. One statement from a man who understands the matter is better than a thousand words.

What these men have accomplished has been done on raw sagebrush land and so I confidently predict that in five years we will be raising larger crops of grain per acre than any section of the U. S. Our foothills are covered with

lunch grass, good water is plentiful at from 12 to 20 feet and our transportation problem is solved, as railroads are on the way. I have been over the world profusely extensively, but never have seen a climate that was as good as this.

We read in the papers daily of some wonderful country somewhere, but in my opinion we have here in Harney county the most wonderful of all, just waiting for the good farmers with modern methods to develop it.

Three years ago there was one house in 75 miles; now we have schools, church services and 70 voters, sitting six miles of my ranch. Along telephone, store, hotel and post office and R. F. D. mail route, so it would seem that most of us in this section have the same faith in the future of the valley that I have.

"Farming without irrigation in Harney Valley has been well tested this year, and the wheat produced has averaged thirty bushels to the acre, while oats and turfs have made an average of fifty bushels to the acre, some of the fields producing eighty-four bushels of barley in the acre."

MAINTAINING STONE ROADS

Protective Value of Worn Road Mixer With Oil and Grease
One who is interested in road building and thinks he knows a few things to maintain a macadamized road in a thoroughly effective and cheap way is...

With the soft wheeled automobile all this changed for the worse. The rapid revolution of the broad wheels and the suction caused by them and by the low bodies of the machines loosen the little stones more easily and quickly, and as there are hardly any iron wheels left to grind and crush the loose pebbles the small holes soon become plentiful, and before long they grow into large ones and ruts.

To sprinkle the roads with kerosene is quite impracticable to prevent spalling. It must be something that has a body that will bind the particles of the road fill all holes and protect the surface. It must be solid enough to be strewn by the road. There are probably many ways of producing such a road preserver, and many experiments might be made for it, but one of the best, I think, would be wood meal—that is, ground sawdust, ground hay or straw, ground cornmeal or any such article which is cheap and plentiful and which can easily be ground to meal and which will float and not clog up the sewer.
