ALTURAS DELAYING LAKEVIEW RAILROAD

Reno Gazette: Manager T. F. Dunaway of the Nevada California-Oregon railroad states that the winds and warm weather are now causing the snow in the mountains north of Reno to melt and that his road is having considerable trouble with floods. He states though that there have been no accidents yet and no serious delays.

Mr. Dunaway also states that at present the work of extending the line from Alturas to Lakeview is not in progress as certain parties at Alturas refused to allow his road a right of way and they had to go to the courts. He states, however, that he hopes to see the trouble settled in a short time, when the building of the road will commence once more.
