Notwithstanding that the extent of the national lands has steadily decreased through reservation and settlement 111,000 sotries were established during the first half of this year while 80 000 was the total for the corresponding period of the

preceeding twelve months. This increase of 30,000 is attributed in a large part to the 320-acre homestead set for he settlement of certain lands for dry tarming. One arid hundred and eighty entries were made in one day at Great Falls,


