New Comer Likes Lakeview and the Tributary Country

D. A. OWENS arrived here in Lakeview from Silverte, Colo., has written a letter back to his home paper, the New Free Press, an account of his trip. He came in via Klamath Falls, and says:

Lakeview, Ore., Feb. 17, 1910. Editor New Free Press, Lafayette.

Dear Sirs—Many of our friends wished me to write to them, telling of our trip and what we thought of the country. As most of them read the News, I thought I would write through your paper, if you would kindly print my letter.

We started from Lafayette January 5. Leaving Denver the same day we came via the Union Pacific, passing through Echo and Weber canyons and crossing Great Salt Lake. On the morning of our seventh day we awoke in the beautiful Sierra Nevadas. While crossing those mountains we passed through about 20 tunnels and for over 40 miles our way led through snow sheds. Leaving the snow-covered mountains we suddenly emerged into the fields of sunny California and as suddenly left the flower-covered fields and winding our way through the mountains again, arrived at Klamath Falls on the evening of the 18th.

We found Klamath Falls to be a thriving little town, situated near streams abounding in large trout and surrounded by mountains in which the wild game affords great sport for the hunter. Starting from Klamath Falls January 23, we traveled by wagon road, the greater part of which led through forests of large pine trees. At the end of six days we beheld Lakeview, situated at the foot of a low range of mountains and overlooking Goose Lake valley.

It is a business town for one situated 60 miles from the nearest railroad. The population of Lakeview is about 2000, but judging from reports it will likely to be double this within a year or two. Atmosphere
