OUR DEVELOPMENT CO. SECURES CALIF., LAND

He says his company have recently acquired 6773 acres of land near Arbutus, California in a 16000 acre county. The land will be subdivided into tracts from 15 to 100 acres. On each 100 acre tract the company will put down a well which it is claimed will provide ample water for irrigation purposes. The land will be sold at from \$40 to \$60 per acre, on easy terms.

FRANK HACKNEY GETS A FAT CONTRACT

OAKLAND, March 29--Frank Hackney of 378 Harrison street, San Francisco, has just been awarded the contract for the wagon mail service of the Oakland Postoffice. The contract, which is under the direct control of the postal officials at Washington calls for at least nine horses and wagons for the carrying of the mail matter in Oakland and from the various stations and between the main Postoffice and the different branches. The wagons must be furnished by the carrier himself, and must be of the regulation wire-covered prescribed in the contract. The term of Hackney's contract is for four years, beginning on July 1st next. For the service he will receive \$10,500 per year. Any extra services that the Postoffice requires must be furnished by the holder of the contract, without further remuneration than the amount named in the contract.
