The deputy game wardens, are beginning to stock all the trout streams in the county. All people taking water in ditches from streams in which fish may exist, should be notified that such intakes are screened and fish-ladders placed in the weirs and dams.

If any do not know how to construct the fish-ladders, they should write to H. A. Utley, Valley Falls, deputy game warden, who will give them information as to putting in screens and ladders. The cost will be small in any case.

It is said that great loss of fish occurs each season, about Paisley and also in the Warner valley, from lack of screens which allow the fish to run out on the meadows, and when the water recedes they perish by the thousands.

It would seem that every one should be interested in saving the fish, and the fact that it is unlawful to neglect placing screens and ladders, and may cost delinquents both time and money if not imprisonment.
