The hen that makes Oregon famous is of ordinary size.

WHAT LAKE COUNTY MAY EXPECT LATER

As an instance of what apple production means for a country, the Hood River Apple Grower's Union states that the 1910 apple crop of the far-famed valley will reach 350,000 boxes. It is also stated that in four weeks there will be required from 2000 to 4000 men to pick the fruit. By the time this work is completed, there will be work for more thousands picking and packing strawberries. The Hood River Valley, as well as other fruit-growing sections in the Pacific Northwest, know what will be done in this line in the valleys of Lake county, when the railroads enter our domain. Where heretofore the country has only supported a few dozen cattlemen and their successors, will soon come thousands that will reap wealth from the cultivation of orchards, as will be the case in this section. It is now assured that one orchard in bearing gives employment to a larger number of people and yields larger profits than many farms with ten and twenty as large an acreage. And that is why there are thousands headed for Oregon from all over the Union.
