\$20,000 School District No. 7 Building Bonds

Sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned County Treasurer of Lake County, Oregon, until the 2nd day of July, 1910, at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon of said day, at which said date and hour at the office of the said County Treasurer in the town of Lakeview, Oregon, all proposals to purchase said bonds will be opened and considered for the purchase of \$20,000.00 of 5 per cent coupon building bonds of said School District or any part thereof to be issued in pursuance of subdivision 31 of section 3580 of Ballinger and Cotton's Annotated Code and Statutes of Oregon.

Said bonds will be payable twenty years from date of issue. Optional after ten years. Interest to be paid semi annually on the 2nd day of July and January of each year. Principal and interest payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the County Treasurer of Lake County, Ore. or at such Bank or Trust Company in the City of New York as may be designated by the purchaser of said bonds. Said bonds shall be sold for cash paid down at date of sale, and not less than their par value and shall draw interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum and be issued in the denomination of twenty bonds of \$1000.00 each. Each proposal to purchase said bonds must be accompanied by certified check upon some responsible bank for 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

The County Treasurer reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
