

CALL FOR ASSEMBLY

Republicans to Meet at Portland July 21

Assembly to Consist of 1248 Delegates, of Which Lake County is Entitled to 9

The following call for a state assembly has been sent out by the Republican State Central Committee:

"Pursuant to the direction of the Republican State Central Committee last chosen under the provisions of the Direct Primary law, and authorized by that law to make rules and regulations for the government of the Republican party in Oregon, an assembly of the Republicans of this state, through their representatives to be selected from the different precincts and counties is called to meet in this City of Portland, Oregon Thursday, July 21, 1910, at 10 a. m. for the purpose of formulating and adopting a party platform and to recommend to the favorable consideration of the Republican voters of this state the name of a candidate, best qualified for each of the elective state offices, representative in congress and judicial and district offices composed of more than one county, subject to nomination at the primary election to be held on September 21, 1910, as provided by law:

"The apportionment of delegates and the district counties as fixed by said committee, being one for each 50 votes, or major fraction thereof of the vote cast for William H. Taft at the last presidential election, is as follows:

No proxies will be honored in said Assembly, but in the event of the inability of the duly elected delegates to attend for any cause their vote is to be cast from the membership for that county, according to the majority of opinion of those present and acting.

"It is recommended that county Assemblies be held by the Republicans in each of the counties of this state, on Saturday, July 16, and that the meetings for electing delegates and that the delegate to be elected in such manner as the county central committee for each county may provide.

The Good Roads campaign now being conducted by Judge Lionel K. Webster throughout Oregon is not only attracting an unusual amount of newspaper comment, but the Judge is convincing his large audiences that only in Multnomah county can direct taxation be depended upon for good roads through Portland's heavy tax contribution and that long time bond issues are about the only way to get good roads during the life time of the present generation throughout the state at large. A constitutional amendment will be required to bring this about. The trip through Oregon of President Louis W. Hill of the Great Northern Railway has probably occasioned a greater amount of newspaper comment in the papers of the state than has been accorded the visit of any other man during the last ten years. Mr. Hill's entrance into Central Oregon from Shaniko was somewhat arduous, as he started immediately after the hardest rain for twelve months, which had resulted in making some of the roads almost impassible, but he was determined to see all there was to see, and his personal discomfort was never mentioned. In every place he had something definite and decisive to say. His visit has served as a tremendous encouragement to those interested in the development of Oregon.

Never did Oregon look so clean, slick and span as at the present time. Eastern and Central Oregon have had rains at just exactly the right time. Western and Southern Oregon are intensely prosperous, and the carpenter, cabinet maker, painter, designer, landscape artist and busy housewife have had more than they could do in every section, for the disposition to clean up and paint up and put the best foot foremost was never more contagious than at the present time.

Socialist Convention

The Socialist convention at Klamath Falls next month promises to be a big affair, as Eugene V. Debs, Gaylord Wilshire, and numerous other prominent figures will be present. Relative thereto the Klamath Chronicle says:

Already communications to D. E. Burrell, head of the Socialists here, from all parts of the district which embraces all of Oregon and Northern California, asking that places be assigned for large numbers who will come from their territory.

Dorris telephoned yesterday to reserve space for from 100 to 150 people who were coming from that place and Mr. Burrell, who has recently returned from the Silver Lake country, stated that many are coming from that part of interior Oregon by wagon and other overland conveyances.

The leaders here state that no less than 5000 people will be in the city on this gala occasion for the Socialists. They will come from all parts of the district and hundreds from other districts will come to hear the speaking which will be made by the above National leaders of the Socialist movement, who have been assigned to come here.

Mr. Burrell and E. W. Miller, who have had charge of the raising of the funds for the entertainment of this horde of people who will come on this occasion of the unaccompanied, now have \$13,000 pledged. They started out to raise \$2000 and are sure this will be forthcoming.

Wool Sales Called Off

PENDLETON Or., May 25.—Owing to the demoralized condition of the wool market the Umatilla County Wool Growers' Association held a meeting yesterday morning and voted to call off the wool sales date scheduled for the afternoon. Notwithstanding this fact a few growers met with the buyers at the warehouse and a few clips were put up. Only three were sold all others being withdrawn. The prices paid ranged from 12½ cents to 16½ cents per pound. Those who sold were: C. A. Peterson, Charles Johnson and Pedro Bros.

The wool buyers and representatives of the freight departments of the different railroads went to Echo this morning for the scheduled sale there, but it is expected that few, if any, sales will be made. The impression prevails that most of the Umatilla County clip will be shipped to the Chicago Co-operative warehouse and stored until the market conditions are more favorable. The growers were expecting in the neighborhood of 23 cents, and their disappointment is keen. They feel that they lost several thousand dollars by selling early last year, and most of them are anxious not to repeat the mistake.

Only 85 Years Old

Probably few of us realize that the first expedition through Central Oregon was made but 85 years ago. In 1824 and again in 1825 Peter Skene Ogden on behalf of the Hudson Bay Co. led a party from the Columbia up the Deschutes and across the present homestead country to the Snake river on the Idaho line. The diary kept by Ogden on the second trip is published in the December issue of the Oregon Historical Society's Quarterly. Strange indeed will be the contrast of the country encountered by the sturdy explorer and that soon to be seen by the traveler from the windows of Central Oregon trains.—Bend Bulletin.

The proposed evangelistic crusade to offset what some clergymen style the brutalizing influence of the Jeffrey-Johnson fight, is taking form. Two New York preachers have accepted invitations to go to San Francisco and hold revival meetings as counter attractions to the big fight. They are the Rev. John Wesley Hill, one of the originators of the crusade, and the Rev. John Callahan, a mission worker.

The House has declined to give the necessary two-third vote in favor of a change of the date of inauguration of President and vice president of the United States from March 4 to the last Thursday in April. The bill introduced by Henry of Texas to amend the constitution for this purpose, received a vote of 139 yeas and 70 nays, one less than the two-thirds required for its adoption.

Last Friday the senate by a vote of 59 to 19 adopted a compromise amendment to the railroad bill for the regulation of relative charges for long and short haul.

Just what the result of the enactment of the bill will be will no doubt be determined by the courts, as there is said to be a big difference among the senators as to its meaning.

Rev. Henry N. Couder, the blind chaplain of the house of representatives, astonished the members of the body by praying for divine guidance to lead the sneek rakers to "rake before their own doors before attending to the litter in front of their neighbors' homes."

OREGON'S BIG GAIN

Census Shows Increase of 250,000 People

Will Likely Result in Entitling State to Additional Congressman

In a recent article on the population of this state the Portland Oregonian says:

The census enumeration of the state of Oregon, so far as it can be confirmed by officers of the Census Bureau, will show a population of 675,879. The net gain to the state will be 262,343.

While official figures are not obtainable, a comparison of the totals for each county, as gathered during the progress of the work, with the total school population, the votes cast for Judge of the Supreme Court since the census in 1900, and the vote on Congressmen, warrants the belief that the Oregonian's figures are approximately correct.

An interesting feature of the result pertains to the total number of Congressmen to the total number of which will be awarded to the state and the possibility that Multnomah county will be declared a separate congressional district.

ONE CONGRESSMAN TO BE GAINED

Representation in the present Congress is on a basis of one member for each 194,000. Congress is likely to be increased by the addition of 20 members on a total population of 90,000,000 in the United States. On that ratio representation would be on a basis of one for each 215,000 people. Oregon would then gain at least one member.

In both Congressional districts the work of the field enumerator is still in progress and will probably not be concluded before June 1. At that time all of the remaining records will be boxed and shipped to Washington for tabulation. Estimates furnished from Director Dunsen, of the Census Bureau indicate that official figures as to the result of the count will not be available before October.

An appeal for Philippine independence has been filed in the house of representatives by Manuel L. Quezon, resident commissioner for the Philippine islands. Quezon declared that the Filipinos appreciated all that the United States government had done for them, but they could never be completely happy unless independent.
