AT WORK ON ROADS

County Court Makes Good Their Promise

Result of Hill's Visit Will Make Lake County More Easy of Access

During the visit of the Hill party in Lakeview the importance of good roads was not only presented to the public by Mr. Hill, but he and Mr. Stanley urged the County Court to improve the roads leading into Harney and Crook counties so that no trouble would be experienced by motorists and others in touring Central Oregon. To that end two crews are now employed in putting the main thoroughfares of Lake County in good shape and the work will soon be completed. One crew is at work on the road leading from Plush to Bluejoint and on to the "Double O" ranch. This crew will repair the road to the county line, and if instructions are followed it will be in good shape for all kinds of vehicles. The other crew is at work on the road up past Albert Lake and Alkali to Burns, thus affording two routes to our neighboring county. It will not require so very much work to put the latter road in good shape, as much has already been accomplished to that end, and besides for a great portion of the distance the road is naturally good owing to the formation through which it passes.

The road north to Crook County will also be put in first class shape and while we can then boast of second to none of the interior counties in the matter of good roads, for the road west to the Klamath County line is in good condition.

Under the recent order of the County Court to road supervisors there is no reason why every foot of the road in the county should not be in good shape. Perhaps the only excuse will be the inability of the supervisors to find time to do the work for they as a rule have just a little more work to do at home than they can attend to, and as a natural consequence are necessarily compelled to do the road work when they can, rather than when they feel that it should be done.

Possibly An Accident

What is considered to be a recurrence of the range troubles over on the Klamath county line occurred a few days since when D. P. Malloy's sheep camp was destroyed by fire. The fire occurred during the absence of the herder, and he is positive that it was of an incendiary origin, as he had had no fire near the tent. Beside the tracks of a shed horse were found near the scene, and that fact indicated that the camp had been visited by some one on horseback.

Range troubles are of long standing over in that section, although none occurred last year. The year before, however, much trouble existed which for a time threatened to result seriously, although the differences were finally adjusted without resorting to gun and pistols. It is not thought that any further trouble will occur this year and that whoever committed this latest outrage did so on the spur of the moment, rather than as the result of premeditation.

Forestry Sale of Timber

Machinery is being taken to the old saw mill site eight miles above Paisley, and June 3rd bids will be opened by the Forestry service for 6,000,000 feet of logs to be sawed during the next five years. The bids must not be for less than \$2.70 per thousand feet log measure and there is a time limit on the cut. The timber being now fully matured is to give way to a new growth. This feature of the Forestry policy can be appreciated by every man in the Chewaucan and Summer Lake Valleys, for there has been a scarcity of lumber for building purposes.

Dick Takes a Vacation

Dick Wilcox thinks he is having a vacation having taken a lay off for a month from his duties as assistant cashier of the First National Bank. Between his auto, sheep shearing plant, running a ranch, selling wood and a few other little things, he is likely to feel greatly refreshed at the end of his leave. However, Mrs. Wilcox expects to have him accompany her on a trip to the Willamette, and it is therefore likely that he will be able to buckle into the work with renewed vigor when he returns.
