The base ball boys will cross bats with the Alturas nine next Sunday, and a rattling good game is expected.

J. F. Hanson went down to Doyle this week on a business trip. It is likely that he will get the contract for building the extensions of the N. C. O. into this valley.

Grain in Christmas Lake, Silver Lake, Summer Lake and Chewaucan Valleys looks very promising though a nice rain would work wonders.

It is reported that the land owners under what is known as the Keno canal of the Klamath Irrigation Project have been released from their contracts by Secretary Ballinger.

W. Roche Pick returned Thursday from his trip to the Christmas Lake and Goldie Valley. The gentlemen that accompanied him all took government Homesteads and are enthusiastic over the outlook in these two valleys.

There promises to be one of the heaviest crops of fruit this year that has ever been here which speaks volumes when it is considered that many of the Eastern States have lost all their fruits this year from the frost and storm.

The south end of West street has been opened up and extended to Cogswell street in the Sherlock addition, while Flower street in the Drenkel addition has been extended to a point near the junction of the former streets.

The mountain road between Lakeview and Paisley is in good condition except for a few places where culverts are needed. Automobiles and teamsters prefer this route during the summer months as it is shorter and has an easier grade.

Strawberries and cherries with all the color size and quality of the real Goose Lake Valley article are already in the market from near New Pine Creek. The price is reasonable for cherries, as they are selling for 50 cents per gallon.

The Alturas Plaindealer claims to be in possession of private information to the effect that right of way men are now engaged in securing right of way between Alturas and Klamath Falls, conditioned upon the "road being built within 22 months from Klamath Falls to Alturas."

The hoisting works for the Big Four mine, now under lease to Brown and Trendt, arrived last week and is now being carted to the mine where it will be immediately installed and active mining operations started on a large scale, says the Bidwell Gold Nugget.

An Oregon shingle mill in Tillamook county worked 33 days on one cedar log cutting from it 141,000 shingles. This is almost unbelievable to people not familiar with the Pacific Coast, where big trees and vast timber resources are accepted quite as a matter of course.

Parties are making an effort to have an organization of the state G. A. R. encampment established at Klamath Falls. They have been corresponding with the adjutant general of the state G. A. R. post with the idea of getting him to take up the matter and organize the few old veterans residing in that county.

Alturas Plaindealer: News came to Alturas Monday that Albert Smith, one of the pioneers of Modoc County, had passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Jesse Pagnello at Sacramento. Albert Smith was one of the best known men in Modoc County. He has filled many positions of honor and trust, and always with credit to himself and to the office he held.

Walter Welch, who has been in the employ of the Southern Stage Co., was taken into custody by Sheriff Dent Tuesday evening, on a warrant issued from Klamath county. Some time since Mr. Welch was convicted on a charge of larceny of horses, and was paroled with orders to report at certain times to the Court. It seems that he failed to comply with the order of the court, and a warrant for his arrest was accordingly issued.

Last Contract Let

H. C. Henry, of Seattle, has let to Nelson Bros. the last contract on the 125 miles of construction on the Oregon Trunk railroad, from Madras south to the north end of the Klamath Indian reservation.

Mr. Henry obtained the contract less than a month ago on the lowest bid submitted to President Stevens of the Ore on Trunk. Although it was expected that the Henry outfit would proceed to the scene of construction, Mr. Henry and Malcolm McPhee, who is associated with him, have preferred to sub let every inch of the line.

With one exception, every contract in its lengths from two to 12 miles, enabling close attention to be paid to each sub-contractor.

All the contractors, with the exception of Nelson, have their camp outfits on the ground and are ready to start work at once.

New Auto Road

Band road enthusiasts have undertaken the building of thirty miles of auto road. The work in contemplation embraces a strip 33 miles long in northeastern Lake County, through which a road way will be to connect the present Bend Burns road with the road from Silver Lake to Burns. The road now being used by locators for a distance of 90 miles east of Bend is one of the finest auto highway in the state, and the proposed connection will afford a still longer stretch of magnificent highway into Summer Lake. Autos at present travelling over the road east of Bend that frequent stretches where 30 miles are clipped off in 16 minutes, and the road from northeastern Lake county into Silver Lake is such that the throttles can be thrown wide open in different places for dozens of miles.

Fine Building Stone

The rock for the basement of W. P. Heryford's new residence is now being delivered on the ground, and is causing much favorable comment. It is of handsome reddish color, of excellent quality and becomes very hard after being exposed to the air. It is from the quarry on the hill just above the old Frank Lane place, and is in fine shape for building. G. B. Graves, the mason will soon commence shaping up the rock and the work of laying the same will begin in a few days.

The post-master general, Mr. Hitchcock, is cutting down the usual postal deficit this year. He has instituted many economies in the business management of the department without impairing the service, he claims. From the deficiency fund appropriation which congress provided for the department, Hitchcock has already turned into the treasury \$5,000,000, and expects to be able to turn over \$5,000,000 more at the end of the fiscal year July 1. He expects that the deficit this year will not be more than \$8,000,000 against \$17,000,000 deficit last year.
