Harrell's conduct has not changed in the least since his arrest, and he seems to have no remorse whatever. He has contradicted himself so many times in relating incidents connected with the crime, as well as with his past life, that it is impossible to believe anything he says. He stated that he had been fed at Pat Angland's camp near where he was arrested, where as a matter of fact he was not at the camp at all, so far as any one knows. Mr. Angland had not seen him for two years, previous to seeing him in sail Sunday, and was therefore greatly surprised that he should be accused of assisting him in any

When arrested Harrell had some \$28 m his possession, and in addition thereto a cerificate of deposit for \$200 from the First National Bank of Lake-

Through the courtesy of F. O. Bunting, the Examiner is able to give the following account of Harrell's past life, or at least Harrell signs it as such, although differing very materially from other statements made at different times. His last statement follows:

"My true name is Isaac Neton Harreli I was born in Eola nine miles from Salem, Marion County, Oregon, on the 18th day of July, 1862. My father was of Scotch-Irish descent, and a native of Missouri. [My parents moved to Portland, Oregon, when I was quite young , thence to Portage, about 90 miles from Portland, here they remained for two and a half years. From there they moved to Tillamook Vailey, remaining three years at that place. From Tillamoek

they moved again to Portland, thence to Forest Grove. They lived on my grandfather's place three miles from Forest Grove for some time. My father took a homestead adjoining Parson's place about two and a half miles west of Forest Grove.

"At the age of eight years I attended school for a period of six weeks at a school house near Wm. Shearers's place, when the school was moved to Dilly station, a distance of five miles from father's homestead I attended school there for three months, I size | attended school at Hillstoro for one month, that being all the schooling I ever had

"At the age of 17 we removed to Hillsboro, remaining there with my parents about one year, when I began working for myselt. When at the age of 19 my parents seperate , my moth er removing to Portland There were five boys in the family, the older being myself, sames, Oscar, Marion (deceased) Hervert (deceased), and David Hollis.

"My father and self moved to Cor vallis, and from there to the Alsea valley. We returned to Corvallis and from there to Albany, where we spent the wister. In the spring we went Scio. From Scio to Lebanon, where father bought a piece of land. He lived there about ten years. During that time I worked for various persons, saving sufficient money to purchase a piece of land from Pat Morrow, where I remained for two or three years.

'lu 1893 I went to Prineville, thence to Shepherd's ranch, thence to Gilchrist's sawmill, where I worked about one year. About 1895 I went to work for Wm. Brown. I worked steady for Brown for two years and at various times during the following two years In 1899 I went to Stein's mountain where I herded sheep for Wm. Buffington for about a year. In 1900 I went to Ontario where I purchased a saloon, paying \$1300, \$1000 casu and a \$300 note. I run the salcon about a year. During this time I married Lizzie Arnold, a widow with three children, at Weiser, Idaho. We returned to Ontario from Idaho, and shortly thereaffer purchased a bakery. In 1902 my wife left me and came through to Lakeview, thence to Surprise Valley stopping around Eagleville about one year. In 1903 went to Hay Creek for L. Adams and returned with a band of sheep. In 1904 I herded for George Wilson. I lived on the Coffman ranch nearly two years from 1902 to 1905. About 1905 I went to California workinvarious places for some time at the came back to Lake comments.
